


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he place must have had a strange effect on Sultan Yusuf Sharifuddin Mudzaffar Shah (1877-1887) who, unlike other sovereigns who would select their vantage points carefully so they could detect approaching enemies easily, the Sultan had his first palace built beside the river bank. He named it "Istana Sri Sayong".

Apart from being exposed to the threat of invasion, the other problem was Nature, which led to numerous flooding, as water overflow the tributaries during the monsoon season. The name Kuala Kangsar is believed to be derived from "Kuala Kurang-Sa" (estuary less one), interpreted as "the 99th small tributary to flow into the Perak River". Finally, after the "Bah Besar" (Big Flood) of 1926, Yusuf's successor, Sultan Idris Murshidul Al-Adzman Shah (1887-1916) decided to move the palace onto the knoll, Bukit Chandan, where Istana Iskandariah now stands.

The town maintains a strong link with its colonial past. Icons such as the Padang (Esplanade), Malay College Kuala Kangsar, Kuala Kangsar Club, Victoria Bridge etc. bear testimony to this attachment. Kuala Kangsar or KK is also the site of the first rubber tree planted in Malaysia. The person responsible was English botanist Henry Nicholas Ridley. He helped Malaya and eventually Malaysia become the largest rubber producer in the world. The tree still stands today.

Getting around the royal town is easy. We shall now take you on a trip to Kuala Kangsar. First, find you a place to stay then places to visit and finally, where to eat and rest.

Kuala Kangsar Rest House



uala Kangsar Rest House has undergone a thorough face-lift and is no longer like the colonial rest house of yore. It has 19 rooms of which only 15 are open for booking. The rooms facing Sungai Perak provide a breathtaking view of the river. The rates are RM80 (Superior) to RM170. The KK Rest House is located on the same loop as Masjid Ubudiah, Istana Iskandariah and Sultan Azlan Shah Gallery.



Sultan Idris Murshidul Al-Adzam Shah (1887-1916) commissioned in 1913 the construction of a mosque of great beauty to fulfil a vow made upon his recovery from an illness. The Ubudiah Mosque was completed in 1917, after the death of Sultan Idris, and was opened by his successor, Sultan Abdul Jalil Kamaratullah Shah (1916-1918). Additions have been made recently to accommodate a larger congregation. However, details of the original design were retained to preserve the mosque's character.




Then Sultan Idris Murshidul Al-Adzam Shah (1887-1916) ascended the throne he moved to the western part of the Perak River. Located on the high ground of Bukit Chandan, a new palace known as Istana Negara was completed in 1895. It remained the official palace until the reign of Sultan Iskandar Shah (1918-1938). In 1930, Istana Negara was demolished to make way for a new palace, named Istana Iskandariah. The new palace was completed in 1933. Istana Iskandariah remains the official residence of the Sultan of Perak to the present day. The renovated *Balairong Seri*, part of the new wing of the palace, was first used for the installation ceremony of Sultan Azlan Muhibbuddin Shah.



The gallery is the former Istana Hulu also known as Istana Kota was built during the reign of Sultan Idris Murshidul Al-Adzman Shah (1887-1916). It served as the royal residence until 1954 when it was taken over by the Ministry of Education. Since 2003 it is being known by the present name having been transformed into a gallery providing an insight into the life of the present ruler, Sultan Azlan Muhibbuddin Shah (1984 - present). The grounds of the gallery are richly landscaped and adorned with fountains.

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Istana Kenangan (Royal Museum)



Built in 1926, Istana Kenangan served as a temporary residence for Sultan Iskandar Shah (1918-1938) until Istana Iskandariah was completed. Malaysia's first premier, Tunku Abdul Rahman was involved in restoring the palace and making it a heritage building. The palace was later converted into the Royal Museum. It was officially opened to the public in 1988 by Sultan Azlan Muhibbuddin Shah. Exhibits on display include regalia, photographs, documents and artifacts relating to the present sultan and his predecessors.

Aksa Pak Ngah is unlike the ubiquitous laksa stall you come across in Kuala Kangsar. It is in fact a full-blown Malay restaurant located behind the Tsung Wah Secondary School along Jalan Dato Sagor. You can enjoy the tasty laksa made famous by Pak Ngah or order a Ramly Burger for your lunch break. A plate costs RM2.20 with a hard-boiled egg thrown in. The lunch crowd is huge.

Restoran Yat Lai



typical kopitiam of the Double Lion genre, it is located at: No. 51, Jalan Kangsar, on the same street as Double Lion. The coffee shop is so plain, locating it may offer some difficulties. But locals will not hesitate to point it out when asked. It serves breakfast till noon and lunch beginning from 1.00 p.m. onwards. Roti Kaya and Roti Telur are the two popular breakfast dishes on the menu. At lunchtime, Fried Rice, Fried Keow Teow, Mee Hailam and Meehoon Goreng seem to be the favourites with the crowd. The prices range between RM4 to RM5 a plate.

The Kuala Kangsar Tourist Information Centre is ideally located and easily accessible to all. The centre is manned by staff from the Kuala Kangsar Municipal Council. They are pretty handy

with the right kind of information – brochures complete with road maps.

Keris and Embroideries



tar road just after the Royal Museum takes visitors to Kg Padang Changkat, Bt Chandan where Malay blacksmiths skilled in the making of *keris* and *golok* (machete) and craftsmen apt at crafting traditional embroideries are found. Abdul Mazin Abdul Jamil, 62, has been making *keris* and *golok* since he was a kid. It is an art he learned from his father. An assortment of *keris* and *golok* are available for sale. They are priced between RM1,000 to RM5,000, depending on the designs. Mazin makes replicas of the *Keris Taming Sari* too.

once decrepit and disused mosque located a short distance after the Kuala Kangsar-Taiping junction along Route A 3 (old trunk road) is one of its kind in the whole country. 

The road to Manong. Gunung Bubu Besar and Gunung Bubu Kecil, which form the southern reach of the Bintang Range, are the two popular mountain features in the area. 
