

## THEY BLAME THE AUTHORITIES FOR THE DELAY

**Prima** Condominium cated along Jalan Raja DiHilir (Tambun Road) was the first high-rise condominium ever to be built in Ipoh. Apartments facing south, overlooking Tambun Road and the Perak Turf Club, are referred to as the "Turf View" while units facing north are referred to as the "City View". Prima Ipoh Condominium wasbuilt by Ipkuda Sdn Bhd. The project was completed in 1995.

Locality wise, it is most ideal as it is close to hotels. Parkson Grand, and the Green Town Business Centre with its host of eclectic dining outlets. It is located in a fashionable part of the city.

When Dr Shoba moved into her apartment in 1995 she was proud to be among the first to reside in the first condominium built in Ipoh.

However, things are different now. She felt cheated and feels disenchanted. The administration and maintenance of the condominium are poor and, as a resident feels that more could be done. The responsibility of managing the condominium, she argues, should be given to the residents rather than remain in the hands of the developer. There are sufficient laws to enable them to do so but bureaucratic inefficiency is preventing the residents from doing

Prima Condo consists of two blocks, Ascot and Derby. There are a total of 175 units in all. Each owner pays a monthly sum of RM200 to the developer and the money goes to maintaining the apartments.

Since 1999 some of the senior residents had begun to question the developer about the state of the buildings and the maintenance of its facilities. The quality has deteriorated to an extent that it no longer

worthy of the amount that they have been paying.

Other than maintenance their grouses extend to the method of administration. The developer charges the unit owners commission for renting out their units. Appeals to the developer fell on deaf ears. Subsequently, a number of the senior residents sold their units and left in a huff.

Dr Shoba took me around the buildings one evening to personally view what the problems were about.

The residents' hopes of finally managing their premises materialised when on May 29, 2006. Dr Shoba was issued with her strata title. By end 2006, twenty five percent of the registered owners had their titles transferred to them.

Security too is lacking. In 2004 one of the residents, Ms Lai Wai Fun, was attacked at night while 25 per cent of the owners have had their titles the Original Proprietor viz. Ipkuda "shall convene the first Annual General Meeting (AGM) the Management Corporation". The purpose of the first AGM is to enable the transfer of the management of the property to the residents.

When Ipkuda failed to call for the first AGM the residents approached the **Commissioner of Buildings** (COB). The COB then was the Datuk Bandar, Dato

Mohamad Rafiai.

It was only on April 4, 2008, more than a year after the twenty five percent quota was fulfilled, when the COB wrote to the residents' appointed chairperson directing her (the chairperson was a lady) to convene the first AGM within one month. (Refer to Ipoh Echo online for the mayor's letter).

The meeting's aim is to establish a management committee so that an appointment letter could be issued.

The first AGM was held on April 10 at the condo community hall. Eleven council members were elected by a show of hands. Representatives from Ipkuda Sdn Bhd were, inexplicably, absent. The minutes was signed and a copy presented to the COB, Dato' Mohamad Rafiai.

When Dato Rafiai retired on June 5, 2008 he informed Shoba that he had left word with his successor, Roshidi Hashim, to handover the management certificate to the appointed management committee.

Shoba followed up with Roshidi. He reassured her that the certificate would be issued after he had taken his oath of office on July 29, 2008. Roshidi then set August 27, 2008 for the presentation of the certificate.

On the said date Roshidi, along with Suhaimi Manap (Director Evaluation and Property), showed up at the meeting and had it cancelled instead. Reasons for the cancellation were not given.

Members of the elected committee were riled. Instead of receiving their long awaited certificate they were given the run around. Disappointed, they then sought a appointment with the Menteri Besar, Dato' Seri Mohamad Nizar Jamaluddin. The meeting with the MB, on September 26, was inconclusive. They then turned to Ipoh Echo

Ipoh Echo asked the Datuk Bandar for his views and was promptly referred to Encik Suhaimi Manap for clarification. meeting with the management committee on August 27 was cancelled because of doubts arising with the manner the first AGM was conducted," said Suhaimi.

Mayor Roshidi appointed serving Councillor Rajasegaran, a former Chairman of the Industrial Court, to convene Prima Ipoh Condominium's "First AGM" and to ensure a "legitimate handover" between the developer and the management commit-

Rajasegaran had a preliminary meeting with the developer's lawyers on October 13, 2008. "I found a lacuna in the Perak State Rules which did not cater

for general meetings to be held at the mayor's initiative," he said. The rules require the developer to do SO.

Rajasegarn had devised impromptu procedures and notices which would not conflict with the parent Act.


Notices for the new AGM and election nomination forms had been served by City Council. "Candidates to be elected to the management committee must be registered owners and do not owe any arrears of maintenance fees," said the councillor.

Existing tions are adequate to resolve the issues in hand. Condominiums that were built after Prima Condo have obtained their management corporation certificate without much hassle.

City Council's rejection of the April 2008 AGM is baffling. The reason given was too flimsy. And now it wants a fresh general meeting. The welfare of the residents is of primary importance. They can't be left in a limbo. The dubious way the matter is being handled is disturbing, to say the least.


There could be some hidden hands behind this transgression. We can only speculate.

# THEIR LAND NO MORE

High-handed actions by local authorities should stop. Mayor denies complicity by MBI.

Taking arbitrary ac-I tion seems the norm these days. We often hear and read reports of enforcement agencies coming down hard on those who deliberately flout rules and regulations. In Selangor temples were demolished for being at the wrong place and at the wrong time. Such actions by local authorities have caused much pain and hardship to the people concerned prompting some to seek legal redress.

Over in Ipoh such high-handed actions by the authorities take a different form. Chopping down of trees without rhyme or reason is a favourite. Renaming roads is another. These actions are normally being bull-dozed through by the power-thatbe. Consultation, they reason, is simply too cumbersome and time consuming. Therefore, the best way out is to exert one's authority at the behest of the poor rakyat, of course.

On Thursday, October 30, a piece of state land about the size of ten football fields in Bercham, was systematically cleared to make way for a housing project. The 15-acre land

has sustained some 20 families around the area for many decades. They carved out their own plots and have grown fruits, vegetables and tubers for sale. Market gardening is the only form of subsistence these people know.



## **EDITORIAL**

#### PEMADAM or Persatuan Mencegah Dadah Malaysia was formed on March 22, 1976. Contrary to popular belief the association is not a government agency but a non-governmental organisation, per se. The patron is the Prime Minister himself. He picks his own people to be the association's chairman. The current chairman, Dato' Mohd Johari Baharom, is the fifth.

The association is well represented and has branches all over the country. Almost all federal agencies, less the armed forces, are involved either directly or indirectly.

Is PEMADAM effective? This is the burning question on everyone's lips. As law-abiding citizens we are concerned, as drug abuses are on the rise. Traditional drugs like opium, heroin and morphine have made way

for designer drugs such as syabu, ecstasy and yaba. In spite of the country's harsh laws, drug trafficking is spiralling out of control. This is because of its profitability. A kilogram of cocaine costs RM200,000, syabu RM220,000 while codeine is priced at RM87.50 a liter.

PEMADAM's vision is to make Malaysia drug-free by 2015. Conventional wisdom says otherwise. At the association's 33rd Annual General Assembly in Kuala Lumpur recently, Secretary General Dato' Kamalia Ibrahim, announced a plan to expand membership to one million by end 2009. She touched on the Pareto Principle or the 80-20 rule. That is 80 per cent of the effects come from 20 per cent of the cases. Twenty per cent of the country's population of 25 million is 5 million. Twenty per cent of

5 million is one million. Membership in the NGO is currently about 120,000. Can it recruit a million within 13 months? I doubt.

Judging from the mood of the assembly the vision of making the country drug-free by 2015 is difficult. Members are mostly senior citizens who are clueless about drugs. Most are there for sentimental reasons. The assembly is too costly. There are over two thousands delegates. They are accommodated in hotels within the city. If it costs RM250 per delegate the bill will be over RM500,000. Add to it transport and travelling claims, the eventual bill will breach the RMI million mark. The money would have been better spent on upgrading the 29 drug rehabilitation centres in the country.

United States and the evolution of its society.

Though Columbus is credited with having discovered America in 1493 serious European migration into the US only began in the 1600s. People of African origin appear to have arrived in US soil almost at the same time as the Europeans. The American war of independence of 1776 established the United States as an independent nation and in that revolt the African community appears to have participated. However after the war, slavery continued until the American Civil War.

Whilst slavery was outlawed in 1865 there were no citizenship or equal rights to the African Americans. It was only in 1868 that they were granted citizenship and those born in the U. S. were extended equal protection under the laws of the Constitution including the right to vote. During 1865-1877 many black leaders were elected to local and state offices.

However, the situation changed in 1877. With the withdrawal of Northern troops from the South, Southern white Democrats regained power in state legislatures across the South. Voting rights of blacks were increasingly suppressed, racial segregation imposed, and violence against African Americans mushroomed. While it was most intense in the South, to a lesser degree, it affected the entire nation.

The Supreme Court's

crimination by private individuals or businesses finally ended attempts to eliminate both governmental and private discrimination by legislation. The system of overt, statesanctioned racial discrimination and oppression that emerged out of the South and spread nation-wide remained virtually intact until the early 1950s.

The American Civil Rights Movement began in 1955. It aimed at abolishing racial discrimination against African Americans and restoring suffrage in the Southern states.

In 1964 the Civil Rights Act came into existence. By 1966, the emergence of the Black Power Movement, which lasted roughly from 1966 to

to include racial dignity, economic and political self-sufficiency, and freedom from oppression by whites. The Movement was a struggle for far more

than just civil rights under

law; it was about funda-

mental issues of freedom,

respect, dignity, and eco-

nomic and social equality.

It took a hundred years for the African Americans, from the time they were freed from slavery, to being given their civil rights and half that time since then to have one of them elected to the highest office in the land. The journey has been long and painful but tenacity, determination and true grit has brought about a change in the conscience of the American people. This ability to change and move forward is what makes the United States such a powerful nation.

The US and Malaysia share a common feature, a plural society with sizeable minorities. In time we too would mature and the people of this nation will put its fate in the hands of those they believe to be the best to lead them regardless of racial origin, religion or culture.

When he first arrived here in 1957, at the tender age of 24, it was as technical assistant to the Curator of the Sarawak Museum. The political climate then did not affect him in anyway as he immediately immersed himself in archaeological excavation works in the Niah Caves near Miri. He did some extensive studies on swiftlets found in the caves. In 1961 he joined the Zoology Department of University Malaya and was instrumental in establishing the Ulu Gombak Field Studies Centre.

Among his other achievements were as deputy leader of the Royal Geographic Society expedition to Mulu National Park in 1977-1978 and as advisor to the World Wildlife Federation (Malaysia). Between 1988-1989 he led the International Tropical Timber Organisation mission on sustainable forestry management in Sarawak. In 1990 he was appointed to the Nature Conservancy Council of Great Britain and has been its chairman since 1991.He served in the House of Lords between 1978 to 1999.

Earlier in the day, Lord Cranbrook spoke on "The Contribution of Archaeology to Wildlife Conservation Policies in Malaysia" to an audience of 40 at the Academy's of-

fice in Jalan Sultan Azlan Shah. One interesting theory he advanced was the presence of elephants on the island of Borneo. Tigers are not found on the island but are present in Sumatra and the peninsula. Likewise you don't find

orangutans in the peninsula but are found in Sumatra and Borneo.

#### PLEISTOCENE **EPOCH**

South East Asia was one land mass during the

Pleistocene epoch some 20,000 years BP (before present). It was the last Ice Age and the climate was a lot cooler than it is today. Animals moved freely and that explains why they are found in Sumatra, the Malay peninsula and Borneo.

The absence of tigers and, to a lesser extent, elephants in Borneo, according to Gathrone-Hardy, could be attributed to man. The presence of pigmy elephants in east Borneo, he theorised, is man-made too. The Sultanate of Sulu shipped these animals within the kingdom as a form of tribute to local chieftains..

Lord Cranbrook spoke on the farming of swiftlets' nests which is big business in Indonesia, Thailand and, notwithstanding, Malaysia. Traders in bird nests have resorted to music to lure these birds to their purpose-built brick houses.

In recognising Lord Cranbrook's lifetime achievements and contribu-

tions, he was made a Fellow of the Perak Academy. The award was bestowed on the scholar by Dato' Seri Lee Oi Hian, Vice Chairman Perak Academy.

When reading the earl's citation, Chan Kok Keong, praised the Pakatan Rakyat-led state government for being "enlightened and supportive of scientific research". Perak Academy said Kok Keong was not "averse to naming a butterfly after the state councilors" like what famous researcher, Afred Wallace, did to Rajah Brooke of Sarawak.

The recipient was visibly touched by the accolades and thanked Dato Seri Lee Oi Hian and Perak Academy for the honour.


#### MORE RESIDENTS THAN WORKERS



## YASMIN AHMAD LOVES IPOH

Yasmin Ahmad, writer and director of multiple award winning movies was in Ipoh recently to produce a twominute advertisement for Petronas for the recent Deepavali festival.

Shooting for the ad was being done at the hangars belonging to the Aeronautic Aircraft Training Academy located at the Sultan Azlan Shah Airport.

Yasmin Ahmad has been producing advertisements for over 25 years. Sometime around 2001 she honed her writing and directing skills toward making movies. The result was Rabun (Failing Eyesight) her first movie and one which was screened at international film festivals in Singapore, Italy, France, Greece, Taiwan and Japan. Unfortunately, in Malaysia it was only good for a TV slot.

What caused her to switch her genre? "Well, dad fell ill that year due to his diabetes. I made the movie Rabun to tell him that I loved him. "

A year later when her mum fell ill she made the movie Sepet (Slitty eyes) a love story of a young Malay girl and a Chinese boy (with slit eyes) This movie won the Best Asian Film Award at the 18th Tokyo International Film Festival and the Grand Prix du Jury in Paris. In Singapore, it played for six week, uncensored. Unfortunately, in Malaysia it was almost banned and when it was played it was heavily censored.

Sepet was filmed entirely in Ipoh and subsequently too its sequel, Gubra. " I like Ipoh. The set locations are quiet. There are no live sounds. The people smile a lot and it feels so civilised. It is also near to home that is




The project besides the hotel covers 1.2 km of riverfront stretching from Gunong Cheroh until the Hugh Low Street bridge. Development will be in stages and will take three

## LETTER TO EDITOR

# PUBLIC TRANSPORT IS PUBLIC NOT PRIVATE. THEREFORE, THE INTEREST OF THE PUBLIC SHOULD BE PROTECTED NOT SOLD.

Dear Sir,

The issue of public transportation has much to do with the economic and environmental sustainability of cities. It is not dissimilar to the arteries and veins that connect and nourish our bodies.

Cities are places of exchange, be it economic or social, the more we encourage this exchange, the better it is for the city. This mix of people coming together for these exchanges is what makes cities vibrant, cosmopolitan and attractive. Good public transportation allows citizens of cities to have many more of these exchanges conveniently and at very, very low costs.

The only model of

transportation that has worked in all the progressive cities of the world is an inter-modal model, a true and tried system.

This means that we have to connect planes to trains to buses to bicycle paths to pedestrian paths and all the other permutations that this mix allows. The more this matrix of transportation interconnects, the more convenient the movement of the citizens of the city.

Good city planning has always been about planning the public transportation routes in anticipation of serving the most number of people. It is not about serving the public alone but the economics, as well. So public transportation works at a certain

density of ridership.

So what do we make of the current situation in Ipoh?

The proposed bus terminal is located out of the city centre at Meru. It smacks of demographic disposition patterns so abhorred in progressive and cosmopolitan cities. Something I believe the current Pakatan Rakyat government is trying to avoid.

There are absolutely no trains or planes to connect the Meru terminal. It only connects private cars and taxis which, essentially, create bottlenecks during peak hours.

What is infinitely more wasteful, however, is the abandonment of existing infrastructure in the city

centre. The interconnection between the Ipoh railway station and the Medan Kidd bus station is a case in point. Their adjacencies allow for an efficient bus-train connectivity at the heart of the city, which will make the city vibrant once more.

Because a rail passenger from KL Sentral can be connected by bus to the city suburbs, he/she does not have to be picked up at the station but instead at a smaller bus interchange in the suburb. This reduces traffic movements and time spent on the road.

We should learn from the most successful public transportation system in the developing world, Curitiba, Brasil.

Enact laws that pro-

tect the public through the understanding of positional advantage Every node/interchange of public transportation will have an impact on neighbouring properties - a higher valuation. These windfalls should be protected and used to improve the public infrastructure of the city.

The reason public transportation is so called is because it is public and not private. Which means that the city should be the majority owner of the system. It acts both as an integrator and a subsidiser. As the city grows the system can continue to be sustained profitably.

Kuala Lumpur transport system is a classic example of poor planning. The city's three Light

Rapid Transit systems crisscross the city with lousy interconnections. There is no cooperation between the service providers.

LRT stops are provided based on the amount of money land owners are willing to cough up illegally. No money no stop. Unfortunately, the stops are built based on demographic (racial) rather than density patterns.

Public transportation is about accessibility. And the right to access for the citizenry of a city should be protected from private interest. The accessibility of people within a city ultimately means the accessibility of opportunities for its citizenry.

On Thursdays, they arrive at the Astroturf training grounds faithfully, a 30-minute journey from Buntong, all in their own mode of transportations – cycle, on motorcycle and town buses. All for the love of the game and a strong belief that they will be lifting the champion trophy one day.

To find out the potential of these spunky and spirited young men, Ipoh Echo contacted a seasoned hockey player, Saiful Adzuan Ismail, the head coach of Sukan Teras at National Sports Development Programme from 2006 to mid 2008.



## FOUNDING OF IPOH CLUB

The Royal Ipoh Club is three years older than it is supposed to be. The committee blames the Japanese Imperial Army for destroying the club's records.

three years older than it is supposed to be. The committee blames the Japanese Imperial Army for destroying the club's records.

The November 21st 1935 issue of the Times of Malaya carried an interview of Mr. James Richard Crawford, then the European with the longest domicile in Perak, having lived in the State for 50 vears. In the interview Mr. Crawford recalled how the Ipoh Club was founded.

In 1885, JR Crawford joined the Perak State Railway. He arrived one month before the State's oldest railway was opened. It consisted of just one short line – from Port Weld

The Royal Ipoh Club is to Taiping. He served the Perak Railway for six months and then joined the engineering firm of Walter Tate and Co in Taiping. In 1891 he was sent to open a branch at "Paloh" as Ipoh was then also called.

> Crawford made the journey from Taiping to Ipoh by ghari. He was accompanied by Mr. A. Oldfield, a chemist, who had been in charge of Dispensary Maynard's in Taiping but had tendered his resignation to look for greener pastures in the new mining centre. Oldfield started Ipoh's first chemist shop, Oldfield's Dispensary, and soon became a fixture of the town, with his everlasting white coat. He was known to

the locals as Tuan Lima Kupang, for he invariably charged fifty cents for any ubat that he made up for

There was only a handful of Europeans in Ipoh at the time, and five or six of them would meet at midday at Oldfield's Dispensary. Each had his own bottle of Scotch hidden behind the medicine bottles. Oldfield would sell them soda. Within a year the gathering had increased sufficiently to form a club. And at one of the meetings in 1892, Ipoh Club was conceptualised. JR Crawford was one of the founding members. The membership of the Club at the beginning was 19. The club's first home was a wooden building with an attap roof built in 1893 at the junction of Club Road and Hugh Low Street.

In 1894 the Perak Government Gazette was already using the Ipoh Club as a focal point for defining the town limits:

The junction of the new road from the Club with the Ipoh-Kuala Kangsar road; the bridge on the further side of the bendang at the 56th mile on the Gopeng road; 300 yards beyond the junction of roads near Datoh Muda Wahab's house, Batu Gajah road; 200 yards beyond the railway crossing on the road to Changkat Pari, and lines 200 yards from, beyond, or parallel with, the public road or street which is furdirection within the points named.

The first billiard competition of the club was held in August 1894, and Perak Pioneer.

The founding of the Ipoh Club is a story worthy of inclusion in any romantic annals of the East. However, according to the official website of the Royal Ipoh Club, the founding of the club was fixed at 1895 by its Management Committee in 1972. The committee's premise was made based on the establishment of one of the oldest British companies, Osborne and Chappel International.. The company was estab-

thest from the town in any lished about this time. What queer logic and what a novel way of writing (or rewriting) history – by guesswork and inference.

However, the this was reported in the Committee did harbour some doubts as to the wisdom of their approach and put in a disclaimer. "It (the Royal Ipoh Club) may have been established much earlier than 1895, but records of its history were lost during the Japanese Occupation". What a flimsy excuse. There are records stored elsewhere if they only cared to search for them. As a result, the Royal Ipoh Club celebrated its Centenary three years late, in 1995. Like a vain woman, it always understates its true age!

## **ONE POSTPONMENT TOO MANY**

## A simplistic look at how lower courts deal with petty criminals.

Whenever I pass by the Ipoh court buildings I either see a large crowd or none at all. Out of curiosity, I stepped into one of the magistrate courts, one morning. The gallery was full. Only standing room was available.

Three men were in the dock. The charges against them were read. They were told what sections of the law they were being charged. The maximum penalty was also told to them. All three nodded their heads in agreement They understood the charges.

The first guy was accused of stealing a motor cycle. The Police found many more stolen bikes at his house. The man pleaded guilty and bail was set at RM4,000. Since he did not have the money he was sent back to the lockup. The case was postponed.

The second defendant was charged for possession of drugs. He pleaded guilty but was unable to pay the bail set. He too was sent back to the lockup. The case was also postponed.

The third person was arrested on suspicion of housebreaking. He was riding his motorcycle when the Police napped him. The suspect denied the charge and requested for trial. He paid the bail of RM1,000. The case was postponed and he was told to hire a lawyer.

The lawyer of another accused failed to turn up. The case was postponed. The magistrate told the

man to make sure that his lawyer was present when his case was up for hear-

#### VICIOUS CYCLE

A few days later I was in the same court again. I noticed that almost all the cases were being postponed for one reason or another. I walked away feeling dejected.

Since magistrate courts deal with petty criminal cases, I feel they ought to be settled quickly, But that doesn't happen. No wonder cases at these courts keep mounting. Those who cannot post bail have to be kept in custody. This is a vicious cycle.


Ipohites had responded positively to the call for charity. Glitches notwithstanding, the dinner was a huge success. Proceeds


