

A SOCIETY TO EMPOWER MALAYS



The Kamunting Christian Cemetery holds a record of sorts. It has the largest number of Australian servicemen and family members buried in Malaysia. All in all 65 members of the Australian Defence Forces were buried in graves all over the country. Out of this, 40 were interred at the Kamunting burial site, which is located next to the Taiping Tesco Hypermarket. They were casualties of the Malayan Emergency (1948 to 1960) and Confrontation with Indonesia (1963 to 1966).

For over two decades families and friends of the fallen heroes have been coming regularly to Ipoh and Taiping to honour their loved ones. Some come on their own while others make their journey in June to coincide with the annual memorial service at the God's Little Acre in Batu Gajah. The desire to have a dedicated service for the Australians buried at the Kamunting Christian Cemetery has been actively pursued by members of the National Malaya and Borneo Veterans Association Australia Inc (NMBVAA). Earlier attempts at making headway came to naught as those entrusted with the responsibilities gave up after encountering several obstacles. Moreover, they were not resolute enough. It requires more than just lip service. Association members visited the cemetery last year but no formal service was held other than some silent prayers for the dearly departed.

Dedicated Memorial Service

This year it was different. A dedicated memorial service, steeped in military tradition, was held on the morning of Thursday, June 11, at the Kamunting Christian Cemetery. Some 100 personnel, local and foreign, attended the service.

Stephen Stoon (Steve), the Association's newly elected National Liaison Officer for Malaysia, was the prime mover. Steve was a sergeant with the Royal Hampshire Regiment. He served in Hong Kong in the early 70s when a battalion from the regiment was stationed there.

Upon assuming the post of liaison officer late last year, Steve took it upon himself to get

things moving. This involved direct communications with the Australian Prime Minister, Kevin Rudd, Defence Minister, Joel Fitzgibbon and High Commissioner to Malaysia, Ms Penny Williams. A local NMBVAA chapter was set up in Ipoh and is manned by friends of the Association. When many were sceptical of Steve's efforts, members rallied behind him to provide the moral support he badly needed.

Valuable Assistance

The assistance of the Australian rifle company in Butterworth proved valuable and through its Commanding Officer, Lt-Col Campbell Paine, works to clean the graves were done post-haste. Brig-Gen Dato' Zulkifli Mansor, Commander 2nd Infantry Brigade, was instrumental in getting the army to help. The 9th Battalion Royal Ranger Regiment, under Major Suleiman Ghazali,

the battalion's second-incommand, offered to make the service comfortable and meaningful. Marquees, chairs, public address system, a soft drink stand and a ready crowd were provided *pro bono*.

Colonel Campbell and

his men were there in full force during the ceremony. Attending on behalf of Ms Penny Williams was Senior Counsellor, Arthur Spyrou, Lt-Colonel Yusof from Taiping Staff Station represented the brigade commander while Lt-

Colonel Mick Birtles attended on behalf of the Australian Defence Advisor. Unfortunately, neither local dignitaries nor senior government officials from Taiping were present although invitations were sent to them individually.

Raising of the Flags

The memorial service started with the raising of both the Malaysian and Australian flags followed by speeches by Steve and Arthur Spyrou. The religious service that followed was conducted by Wing Comd (Rtd) Ben Usher, a retired RAAF Chaplin who had served in Malaya as a sapper with the Royal Engineers. John Plenty, the President of the South Australia Branch, NMBVAA, delivered the Australian Ode which was followed by the rouse by bugler, Warrant Officer 2 David Clarke of the Butterworth rifle company. Wreaths were then laid and poppies placed on the

headstones. Members, their families and guests then adjourned to the Taiping New Club for refreshments.

Busy Week for Veterans

The veterans made full use of their one-week stay in Ipoh by attending other memorial services on the card. They were present at the cenotaph remembrance in Ipoh on Friday, June 12, the God's Little Acre, Batu Gajah and the Gurkha Graves at Tambun Camp, Ipoh, on Saturday, June 13. Some attended the Sikh soldiers' pictorial exhibition held at the Tun Razak Library although it was not programmed. The launching of Ipoh World website at the Royal Ipoh Club on Saturday, June 13, was done in their presence

Tourism Potential

The remembrance ceremonies in Taiping, Batu Gajah and Ipoh can be a major tourist draw if they are being properly packaged and promoted. Efforts at making these events a permanent fixture on the tourism calendar should be considered. Tourism Perak and the state authorities should take the lead and make the necessary provisions their for inclusion. Presently, these events are being organised by some passionate Ipohites who have volunteered their service for altruistic reasons.

Ipoh City Council has committed itself to Perak's fallen heroes by providing the required assistance to the organisers of the cenotaph remembrance. The Mayor's gesture is commendable indeed. However, more needs to be done for those who had made the ultimate sacrifice for this country.

From the Editor's Desk

IS IPOH READY FOR THE INTERNATIONAL TOURIST?

fter two years of ne-Agotiations, Firefly is finally touching down at Sultan Azlan Shah Airport Ipoh with its inaugural flight on July 12. Earlier Ipoh Echo reports have highlighted that the entire community have been waiting on tenterhooks for flights to begin. And with it, we're opening the doors of Ipoh to international visitors. Now that it is going to be a reality, the big question facing us is: Is Ipoh ready for them?

The flight to Ipoh seats 72 passengers and

Theoretically, Ipoh can expect 280 foreign visitors each week. Can our present logistical services, specifically taxi and bus services handle this sudden influx of visitors who will inevitably demand transport? The taxi is the first service that greets a visitor but their fares have not yet been fixed while our buses are erratically timed. These two issues can leave a negative perception about Ipoh in general.

Team Effort

Ipoh Echo turned to

General Manager of the Tourism Action State Council to get his views. He fully concurs with the concerns regarding taxis and buses. However, the issue of coping with a foreign influx of visitors go beyond just ground transportation. Rahmad went on to elaborate, "Ipoh is a product by itself. It has its food, heritage buildings and cave temples. When tourists visit, they naturally expect to have comfortable taxis and buses to enable them to access their destinations. But they also and clean food outlets and toilets. Generally, MBI is responsible for this aspect of the city but the whole town must do their part to maintain the product".

Taxis

Ipoh Echo contacted Ms Monica Liew, MATTA Perak Chairman. "The concern here is the condition of the taxi and the fares they charge as our taxi drivers do not run their meters" Liew says, "Group tours are fine as they are catered for by the agents' vans. It is the independent visitors who could face the hassle".

Buses

Regarding the local bus service, Nicholas Chan, National Secretary of the Malaysia Association of Hoteliers pointed out "visitors just want easy access to the various tourist destinations. Like getting from Sam Poh Tong, then to Perak Tong and ending the day at the Lost World of Tambun. Ipoh needs 'Shuttle Buses' that traverses these specific destinations surrounding Ipoh and which allows for

tourists to hop on and off". The current issue for buses now is their routing whereby one has to change buses going from Sam Poh Tong to Perak Tong, which could be confusing to the visitor. Other issues involve the condition and punctuality of these buses and on the other extreme, the erratic no-show factor, leaving tourists stranded.

Local Authorities

Dato' Dr Mah Hang Soon, the state executive councillor in charge of public transport responded that he would be calling for a meeting with the Taxi Owners Association on the above issues. He confirmed that the bus consortium that was formed late last year was still proceeding with their plans. Once their operations are in place they could "help alleviate the situation".

Mr Cheong Kong Fitt, the Managing Director of Combined Bus Services SB confirmed that the company had applied to LPKP for additional routes similar to the 'shuttle bus' routing as mentioned earlier and it is pending approval.

State Executive Councillor for Tourism Dato' Hamidah Osman held a meeting with the relevant departments and associations last week to discuss issues around taxi and bus services and general cleanliness of the town. She also stated that an information counter and a car rental service will be available at the airport.

So should Ipohites get overly excited about the arrival of more international visitors? A chat with Firefly's Marketing Head, Angelina Fernandez revealed that they plan to market Ipoh initially to the Singapore public, the expatriate community working there and subsequently getting long haul travellers to stop over in Ipoh as part of their itinerary.

If Firefly's plans work, Ipoh will have a regular flow of foreign visitors and for a change an additional source of revenue which if marketed efficiently could be the long awaited impetus to spur the growth of Ipoh's tourism Industry for years to come.

PUBLIC TRANSPORT FROM PENANG TO IPOH COULD IMPROVE

Perak can source international tourists from Penang

Tpoh lacks direct access to international tourist traffic. For this reason I have maintained that the most effective way of increasing international tourist arrival to Perak is by sourcing them from the established tourist destinations in the country. Even if only a small percentage of the tourists who visit these destinations are persuaded to extend their travel to Perak, the state would experience marked growth in tourist influx. In this strategy, Penang would be an important resource point. It records substantial international tourist arrivals every year, most of whom are leisure travellers and Ipoh is less than two hours from Penang by rail or road. For close to four years I have been advocating for the set up of a one-stop Perak tourist information and promotion centre in Penang identifying Perak House in Batu Ferringhi for this purpose. Not surprisingly this call has been ignored by all the successive State governments that had been in power during this period. Public transport options

To find out for myself what effort would be needed for tourists from Penang to make their way to Ipoh I decided last week to use public transport to return to Ipoh from Penang. It was a revelation and I feel if measures are not made to improve the service I fear that we would lose out on the 'Free Independent Travellers' market.

I thought that the journey by rail would be an attractive mode providing visitors an introduction to the Perak experience. Unfortunately I was informed that that there was only one service and it began its journey at 7 a.m. in the morning. Since most visitors are on the Island and it would take them a good one hour to reach Butterworth train station they had to be up by five not quite ideal for a visitor on holiday.

I then decided to check out the taxi. I was however informed that I would have to go to Butterworth to take this mode of transport as the cost of taxis from the Island directly to Ipoh would be prohibitive. As I was travelling from the inner city, the quickest way to get to Butterworth was to use the ferry to cross the channel. At the ferry terminal there was not much traffic but there was a queue. But the queue failed to move and there was no indication that the situation was ever going to change. After waiting for around 20 minutes the driver of the vehicle I was travelling in lost patience and decided to use the bridge.

The Coach Alternative

On the way to the bridge he inquired whether I would like to try the coach as the station was not too far away from the bridge. I agreed. At the coach station, though proper sig-

nage was lacking, it was more than made up by several PR personnel working for the various bus companies. I was directed by one of the PRs to a ticket booth and was issued with a receipt which indicated the registration number of the bus that would be my ride and the bay where the bus would be. It was around 3.30 p.m. then and the bus was to depart at 4.00 p.m. The RM19 fare was to my mind a bargain considering that it cost me RM10 to travel about two kilometres in Ipoh by a local taxi from the place I alighted from the bus to my ultimate destination.

As soon as all the passengers were on board the bus, a member of the bus company came into the bus and began collecting the receipts and issuing tickets in exchange. Unfortunately for me she was unable to find my ticket and after communicating with someone through her walkie-talkie she made some gesture to me and before I could find out what the gesture meant she left and the doors closed. I was then left without a ticket and since I had surrendered my receipt to her no evidence I was a legal passenger in the bus.

The bus was not in too bad a condition save for the fact that the outlet of the air-condition duct directly above my seat was missing its control mechanism and I was under a relentless blast of cold air.



Others, apparently used to this, were resolving the problem by stuffing bits of their clothing into the opening.

The Bus Ride

It was around 4.20 when the bus began its journey. By then traffic was building up and it was some time before we reached Penang Bridge. I think I must have dozed off. When I awoke I was surprised that we were still on the bridge. It took me several moments to realise that we were not on Penang Bridge but on a bridge that was remarkably similar to the Penang Bridge. The road signs I saw were not helpful and I began to seriously wonder if I was on the right bus or was I on my way to Alor Star.

The mystery was cleared soon when we arrived at Butterworth. Apparently the journey from Penang to Ipoh included a mandatory stop in Butterworth.

In Butterworth I was asked to change my seat. I obliged partly due to the fact that I was not in possession of a ticket. I subsequently learnt that the reason I was asked to change seats was that the person who sat next to me in my

new location was known to feel women seated next to him and as a matter of policy no woman was made to sit next to this character. I thought that it was quite good management.

By the time the bus left Butterworth one and a half hours had lapsed from the scheduled departure time from Penang.

Thankfully the journey back was without incident. The driver was quite skilful and demonstrated his prowess by driving often with only one hand on the steering wheel and sometimes with none. One hand was always busy with his mobile phone and when his conversations become animated his gesticulations with his other hand resulted in the bus finding its way without his interference.

The driver was also most obliging, allowing passengers to alight in several locations once even in the middle of the highway where there was an exit access road.

As a Malaysian, born and bred here, I found all these quite amusing and not entirely intolerable but I fear that foreign visitors may not be so understanding. That we need to improve is undeniable.

y girlfriend and fellow Ipohite, Ella Macdonald of Filipino decent, is not a foodie, nor does she speak Cantonese. To her lunch is a desultory picking of what's put in front of her, company and conversation taking precedence over food. Yet whenever she suggests lunch, the first place she opts for is Sin Hup Kee.

It certainly isn't a conducive environment for conversation but since they went up market and put in air-conditioning as well as acoustic mufflers on the ceiling, the noise level has diminished considerably. Company and conversation aside, the reason this is her favourite is that this is one restaurant that tickles her taste buds!

New Family Affair

Sin Hup Kee has been in operation for over 30 years. Formerly situated on Jalan Raja Musa Aziz (Anderson Road), it moved to its present premises on Leong Sin Nam Street 12 years ago. The name which means new collaboration or joint venture, was actually coined when they first started operating as a partnership under the name Hup Kee. When Chef Lau Wah Hoy his wife Tan King Bee decided to go on their own, they added the "Sin" which means "new" to the name.

Today the name is synonymous with home-

style cooking at reasonable prices. Judging by the popularity of the restaurant, tables are best reserved in advance However, if you show up on a whim, they make a quick turnover as service is fast and people leave the moment their meal is over and the wait for a table is never more than a few minutes or so during which time, one can order one's food.

The menu is in handwritten Chinese, so for the non-Chinese speaker. ordering can be somewhat daunting but for readers out there, I've included all the Cantonese phonetics, so give it a go.



Kon Jeen Kai

Signature Dishes

The dish for which Sin Hup Kee is famous is their Kon Jeen Kai or Honey Chicken. RM7/12/18 for S/M/L. These are chunks of chicken cut Chinese style (on the bone), marinated and dry fried. Every delicious morsel of chicken is generously

coated in an almost-black honey-flavoured sauce which clings to the meat and not languishing on the plate as is often the case when this dish is not well executed. The chicken was tender and cooked to perfection....not too dry and not soggy.

Next to arrive was their Sam Wong Dan literally translated to mean the 3-King Egg. RM5/7. This dish while simple in its method of preparation - the fresh eggs are beaten, mixed with water, salted egg yolk and chopped century black eggs, seasoned and steamed till just set - requires quite a bit of skill in getting the proportions and timing absolutely spot on. The arrived dish velvety smooth with a generous addition of both salted and century eggs.

Then came the Ham Yu Fah Lam Po a sizzling claypot of pork belly sliced paper thin, with onions, dry red chillies, and the

piece de resistance salted fish, whose aroma came

wafting towards our table even before the dish arrived. RM12. I couldn't stop picking at this dish throughout the meal and even took an extra spoon of rice to soak up the delectable sauce at the bottom.

The other dishes then came in rapid succession. Their signature Assam Fish Head, cut pieces of fish head peeking out from a tangy, well-blended tamarind sauce that had bite but not spicy enough to intimidate those with timid palates. RM25. Next to arrive was another signature dish, their Tow Kok, Ai Kwa, Ha Mai, Choi Po special, a fried concoction of long beans, brinjals, prawns, preserved turnip and garlic, RM7/8/12. Eaten hot off the wok, this dish is one of the reasons Ella and I keep returning to Sin Hup Kee.

Winning Loyal Fans

Other dishes for which this restaurant has won its fans include their Tong Po Yoke, soya-braised belly pork, RM18/28, This was one of the tastiest braised pork belly I've had in a long while. Another equally poluar dish is their Vietnamese Curry Chicken or mixed

seafood, a pungent dry curry frangrant with curry leaves. RM12/15/22 and their individual portions of Kai Lap Fan a rice dish topped with a sauce made with chicken cubes – RM4 - is certainly value for money.

Sin Hup Kee is open both for lunch and dinner and on weekends, to cater to more people they open up their second floor which in effect doubles the seating capacity. As for me. I prefer to avoid the crowds and if I'm hankering for good old-fashioned Cantonese fare, I'll just call, place my order and 'Tah Pau' or takeaway to enjoy in the comfort of my own home.

WONTON MEE

Jonton are little dumplings consisting of minced pork or prawns wrapped in thin dough. The wonton is cooked in boiling water and the 'skin' becomes very soft but still keeps the meat intact. The sign of a good wonton is when the 'skin' almost melts in the mouth before one savours the filling. The fresh un-



cooked egg noodles are neatly apportioned into little bundles and loosened just before cooking. The noodles can be served in soup or, as most prefer, served dry, tossed in dark and light sova sauce, sesame oil, with meat gravy; garnished with green leafy vegetable. The measure of good noodles are when they are served 'al dente' (the Italian description for pasta that are cooked to just the just right consistency) meaning neither hard or soft but still springy.

ide dishes to comple-Oment a Chinese meal can be simply cooked to maximise on nutritional value and minimise on cost. Vegetables cooked the Indian way are very tasty but we all know that greens lose their vitamins if they are subjected to prolonged heat. The Westerners eat salad to retain the full nutrients. This type of mustard greens accepts this mode of stir-frying, and has its own natural taste.

300 g Mustard Greens, fine cut (like for Indian cooking) 2 shallots, sliced 2 pips garlic, sliced Salt to taste

China Mustard Greens (Sawi)

Indian-cut but Cantonese-fried style



A few drops of seasoning or ½ tsp of ikan bilis granules (optional)

Method:


Sauté the sliced shallots and garlic in 1 tablespoon oil when wok is hot. Add in the greens and 1 teaspoon salt, fry till the sawi turns translucent or wilted and a little juice comes out. Shake in a few drops Maggi seasoning. This dish takes barely a minute to stir-fry. It gives out an aroma of its distinctive flavour once it's cooked - very healthy, according to a nutritionist consultant. The nutrients are preserved in this quick cooking and it is a favourite among us, young and old.

Note: Instead of mustard greens (sawi in Malay or choi sum in Cantonese). Other leafy greens, like spinach (bayam in Malay) can also be substituted.

most discerning of golfers. But golf is just one of the many attractions on the



to interfere in her child's playground brawl. Rather than allowing the children to resolve their own conflicts, this mother managed to alienate not just herself but also her child. Both their friendships were jeopardized.

I can barely remember the details of the squabble. I think my friend's daughter was upset by her best friend sharing sweets with another girl. Mistakenly assuming her friendship had ended, she confided in her mother, whereupon her mother promptly phoned the best friend and then her mother, to lecture them.

Instead of calmly reassuring her own daughter or complimenting her best friend on her kindness and generosity, my friend portrayed her as selfish and inconsiderate, and completely overlooked her own daughter's self-importance.

was reluctantly dragged into this melee. The more my friend tried to justify her actions, the more I resisted. The other mother let the cold remarks pass, told her that 'children will just be chil-



dren' and thought nothing more of it.

Law of the playground

But the law of the playground exists. Other children teased the girl for 'carrying tales' and so refused to play with her. Had this misunderstanding been allowed to die a natural death, all the children would be happy. And still be friends. Children will always kiss and make-up, with or without an adult's prompting.

I soon discovered that my friendship was at risk as I refused to agree with my friend, or take sides. She saw this as a violation of trust. A betrayal.

There must be many parents who have gone, or will go, through this ordeal but I have found the following a useful guide.

DO NOT over-react. We must learn to resist the urge to solve our children's arguments because by doing so, we deny them the opportunity to act and succeed by their own efforts.

DO NOT interfere in your children's quarrels. Our actions may worsen the situation. Listen to them, answer their questions and deal with their anger. Interfering causes more harm because other children will perceive the child to be 'soft' or weak, needing the parents to deal with their every problem. The child risks more taunts and rejections.

DO shift the focus around and help build their confidence by widening their circle of interests and friends. Children have to learn how to deal with problems on their own, on or off the playground.

DO intervene only when the safety of any of the children or their property is threatened.

If we act as over-responsible parents, we will only produce irresponsible children. An overprotected child is one who is denied the ability to learn and develop. A dependent child will develop into a demanding adult.





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
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MCC BADMINTON TOURNAMENT

pohworld, an education-Libased organisation now integrated into the facilities of Tenby Schools Ipoh. today launched an internetbased history archive in conjunction with this year's Remembrance Day ceremony held to honour the thousands of servicemen and civilians killed during the Malaysian Emergency (1948-1960).

This occasion was chosen as several of the veterans from the days of the Emergency had donated photographs unavailable elsewhere, to the history archive.

To mark the occasion, Ipohworld also mounted a photographic exhibition at the Royal Ipoh Club, simply called "Snapshots of the Emergency" and featuring a number of original photographs donated by the veterans who regularly attend the annual ceremony.

Orang Kaya-Kaya Panglima Kinta Seri Amar diRaja Dato' Seri Dr Abdullah Fadzil Che Wan, who is also the Chairman of Ipohworld, was present to launch the exhibition.

Ipohworld was established in 2004 to promote awareness and appreciation of Perak, the Silver State of Malaysia and its unique, diverse and rich heritage, with particular focus on Ipoh and the Kinta Valley. In 2006 it ran the extraordinarily successful exhibition "The Story of Ipoh: From Feet to Flight", in cooperation with Darul Ridzuan Museum. Since then, Ipohworld has been trying to get both the Public and Private sectors to support its objective to provide Ipoh with a permanent, lively and interesting heritage gallery with the aim to enhance education and tourism.

Consequently, undeterred by the lack of financial support for a gallery, the project has continued to gather a broad variety of local items and information from worldwide sources. As the collection grew, recording, disciplined preservation and control became essential. Thus, an information archive in the form of a unique digital image database, supported by original research, and available information from acknowledged and credible sources, was born.

To date Ipohworld has documented well over 3000 items in the archive covering a wide range of subjects across the broad spectrum of heritage and social history, based on photographs, documents, interviews, artefacts, books and videos. More items will be added regularly.

Through this database it is hoped to assist individuals and groups, particularly students, with their research, while at the same time promoting the Kinta Valley, once vaunted the richest tin mining area in the world.

In line with present communication trends, Ipohworld, under the

In 2006, the Ipohworld project was integrated into the facilities of Tenby Schools Ipoh, which aligned neatly with the schools' ongoing commitment to encourage interest in heritage and social history among their students while maintaining the project's objective to promote Kinta Valley's



The artist's patron, Dato' Lim Keng Kay, Director of Kinta Properties Holdings Sdn Bhd, viewed Khor as a chronicler, in his ability to record places of interest that are slowly vanishing from Perak state. Khor's simplicity in choosing everyday scenes from ordinary life has made Dato' KK a fan and collector of Khor's paintings.

Another citation worthy of mention is by Mr Ong Kim Seng, the Editor of SE Asia International Artist Magazine and President of Singapore Watercolour Society. He said that a photograph may convey a thousand words, but an original painting conveys much more. A painting is the distinctive expression of an artist -a

window into his inner self.

Unique Style

The overall comments garnered are that Khor is an artist capable of creating his own niche in the watercolour genre. He is commended for his unique style and originality. As a matter of fact, the prints do illuminate the natural ambiance of the places buildings painted, effortlessly. His paintings are intricate yet simple to comprehend. So much detail is presented in each of his paintings, and one can appreciate the dedication and passion that went into each.

The artist's artwork dates back to 1966, as a student at the Nanyang Academy of Fine Art, Singapore. The charcoal drawings shown are his formative expression of his fruitful art career that lay ahead. He mentioned that for two years, he worked daily on these early expressions, an effort he considers a very important part of an artist's basic training.

They include paintings



Many of his paintings have a strong oriental touch that is a reflection of his Chinese heritage. All the prints in the book come with a brief commentary of the painting which provides the reader with a better description of the visuals.

Conclusion

Reviewing this book has been a privilege. It has dawned on me that Ipohites may be coming of age. Judging by the com-



ments by a number of private collectors of Khor's works, it shows that he is an established and recognised figure in the art world, especially by the well-heeled. In most cases, these paintings would have remained displayed 'quietly' in private dwellings but what impresses me is the idea of putting Khor's paintings into a book form, making it accessible to the ordinary people and society at large. The effort encourages people from all walks of life to have a chance at appreciating fine works of art. This solo art exhibition condensed in a book form and titled, "Drawings" makes me feel like I am in an art gallery. It is certainly worth a read.

IPOH POLICE CHIEF ASSURES RESIDENTS

Residents' representatives from Buntong and Lim Garden held a discussion with OCPD Ipoh, ACP Azisman Alias, on June 16. The meeting, organised by Buntong state assemblyman, Sivasubramaniam, was to highlight residents' concerns over the increasing number of criminal activities in their neighbourhoods.

According to Siva vandalism at the Sg. Pari flats in Buntong and houses in Taman Harmoni involved the cutting of lift

cables and fence grills, damaging of corridor lights and graffiti on walls. S. Namasu of Lim Garden told the city police chief that recent incidents of house break-ins and snatch thefts during office hours in Lim Garden had impacted many housewives. They feared for their own safety.

Criminal activities said Azisman occurred everyday and were mostly committed by drug addicts. He assured those present that the situation was under control. Namasu



responded by saying that the residents' perception of crime control by the Police was poor. The presence of police personnel in the neighbourhood, he said, would have a deterrent effect on criminals and suggested that members of the General Operation Force be roped in to make up the number.

Azisman, however, suggested that the residents activate the now dormant neighbouhood watch, Rukun Tetangga, in their housing estates. They could also enlist themselves as members of Rakan Cop. He encouraged them to call the Police hotline 05-2542222. "A police patrol car would in their area

A SOCIETY TO EMPOWER MALAYS

Since the setbacks suffered by Barisan Nasional, in particular Umno, at the March 8, 2008, General Elections, there is a growing concern among Malay communities nationwide that their once dominant influence as a race is becoming eroded. In the wake of the unexpected reversals suffered by the political party, the immediate fear is that Malay rights and privileges are being infringed as the country's political frameworks adapt to changing circumstances and pressures.

Against this backdrop, a group of concerned Malay stalwarts headed by Dato Sri Dr Hj Mohd Hilmi Hj Ismail, organised a forum at Universiti Petronas, Tronoh on August 9, 2008, to find ways to address

the problem. Although only about 200 out of an anticipated 1000 turned up, Hilmi and his committee were not discouraged. They proceeded to act on the major resolution adopted at the gathering - the formation of a nonpolitical society to regroup the "fractious" Malay community, especially in Perak, under a single banner. Thus Gagasan Melayu Perak was formed. After many anxious moments leading to its formation, the Registrar of Society's seal of approval was finally obtained on March 17, 2009.

Hilmi helmed the society's inaugural general meeting on Saturday, June 20 at the Heritage Hotel, Ipoh. Attendance was overwhelming. Over a



thousand participants filled the hotel's ballroom where the meeting was held. Former Prime Minister, Tun Dr Mahathir, was the guest of honour. Although Mahathir did not appear till almost noon, he was the raison d'être for the huge turnout, a far cry from the tiny Tronoh crowd of 2008. The organisers had

picked the right person to create an impact.

Melayu Gagasan Perak is open to all Malays, especially those domiciled in Perak, regardless of their ideological and political leanings so long as they remain true to the society's cause - the preservation of Malay rights and privileges.

In his keynote address to members of the newly formed society, Mahathir alluded to history to trace the steady erosion of Malay rights and privileges. The feudalistic Malays, he theorised, had always trusted their rulers to do the right thing and that included selling off their lands and dignity to the British. A case in point was the ceding of Penang Island to the British East India Company by the Sultan of Kedah in exchange for protection against the marauding Siamese. Others gave away their rights for an annual allowance and a false sense of security afforded by the British colonial masters whose only interest was focused on the riches of the land rather than the well-being of the people. "It's simply allowing others to man our business. Had the Malayan Union of 1948 gotten through that would have been the end of Malay sovereignty", he remarked.

However, forming societies to address ethnic problems with membership confined to only one single race warned Mahathir would counter-productive. be "In a modern multi-racial society like Malaysia, such an association is an anathema. The Chinese and Indians may form their own societies too", he said.

Now that they have been entrusted to lead the way, Hilmi and his unanimously elected committee should take heed of this advice coming from a former Umno President and Prime Minister.
