Far from the Madding Crowd: Ipoh's Lesser Known Temples

Long Tow Ngan Temple

Sooi Fong, generous amiable to every visitor of the Long Tow Ngan (Dragon Head Cave) Temple. Located in the north of Ipoh, the Taoist temple was founded in 1854, making it one of the oldest temples in Perak. Dignitaries who have supported the temple include the late Lam Look Ing, the late Dato' Lau Pak Khuan and Tun Dr Ling Liong Sik.



Palace of Great Emperor of Jade to be completed

The name of the temple is derived from its geographical structure. Located at the end of the long Gunung Lang mountain range, the temple site resembles a dragon head chasing a pearl while facing north, the pearl being the solitary limestone outcrop located adjacent to the range. Just imagine how scenic it is!

The limestone cave in which the temple resides in Gunung Lang, opens up into a giant space where the main prayer hall is located, under a canopy of red lanterns with golden tassels. It then branches off into hidden recesses. Following the principles of feng shui, the picturesque temple harmonises perfectly with the surrounding environment, hence it is brimming with wonders of nature such as centuries-old mature trees and natural rock formations resembling animals, humans and even deities.

"The space accommodating the main prayer hall opens up naturally, it has not been excavated and artificially created. The temple began with just this space. Visitors

usually come for the scenic view, to pray for wellbeing and to be enlightened. With Guan Di Ye (God of War) and Tai Shang Lao Jun (God of Longevity) as the presiding deities, believers also pray to, among others, Great Emperor of Jade, Three Pure Ones, Tai Sui Yeh (Grand Duke Jupiter), Man Cheong Dai Di (God of Literature) and Tai Pak Koong (God of blessing and ethics)," Lee explained to Ipoh Echo. He is the fifth generation priest here, having taken over from his father in 1999.

"The four major events here are the Tai Shang Lao Jun Festival during February 15, Man Cheong Festival on the third day of Chinese New Year, Kuan Yin Festival on



February 19 and Kong Zi Festival on August 27. We have prayers during these days. For Chinese New Year Eve, we have lighting of the first incense of the year, welcoming the God of Prosperity and lighting of the 9-lamps for wellbeing. During the busiest day, we have received over 40 tour buses. Visitors love to visit during the Chinese New Year, public holidays and weekends," Lee said.

"Over 20 natural rock formations appear in pairs, like the *yin* and *yang* in Taoism. For instance, one resembling a fist signifying stinginess and another resembling an open palm signifying extravagance. One must learn to achieve a balance between the two. Equally interesting is one resembling a tiger. Standing from one perspective, it looks like it is fast asleep but from another angle, the animal looks alert," Lee added.

The temple is currently in need of funds for the refurbishment of the existing building and the completion of a new 5-storey complex to be named Palace of Great Emperor of Jade. Thrangu Dharma Retreat Centre

The history of the cave temple dates back to the mid nineteenth century. In 1895, the temple was exempted from registration by order of the British Resident. Previously a Taoist temple under the name of "Persatuan Penganut Nan Yang Koo Miau", it has been converted into a Buddhist centre in May 2005 which follows the Vajrayana tradition of Buddhism. In January 2008, the Registry of Societies Malaysia approved the new name of the temple as "Thrangu Dharma Retreat Centre".

The temple has remained unchanged for many years in terms of its facade and cave layout. Situated close to the lively Tambun town, it is nestled amidst lush greenery, exuding the charm and serenity of a retreat. The oasis of peace conducts retreats and prayers under the guidance of its 40-year-old resident Lama, Lama Sangye from Nepal who entered the monkhood at the age of 15.

Among the latest additions to the presiding statues of the centre are the Green Tara (surrounded by 21 Tara), Mahakala (Protector) and The Three Buddhas (4-Arms Chenrezig, Sakyamuni and Guru Rinpoche). The 11-feet Maitreya Buddha (the Buddha

of the Future) statue, the first in Malaysia, was built in 2014

In the cave, elaborate altars in the alcoves are illuminated with gentle golden lights and flickering candles, providing a soothing tranquillity for the holy place. In addition, the natural limestone formations and aroma of incense lends the cave a special atmosphere. The centre is planning to build a residence for the monks and a canteen on the site. Readers



who would like to donate towards the maintenance and construction can call the centre at the numbers listed below.

The four-storey centre currently conducts a weekly Sunday practice on Medicine Buddha and 4-Arm Chenrezig. The Green Tara Puja is held on the first week of every month. To welcome the Chinese New Year, the centre usually organises a three-day Mahakala

Puja and light offering. Meanwhile, retreats are held upon request and necessity. Each retreat can accommodate up to 50 devotees and can last from one to three days. Interested readers may contact the centre for more information on upcoming activities.

Last year, the centre organised a 5-day Fire / Auspicious Tara / Sutra of Golden Rays Puja from Friday, October 28. Conducted by Lama Yonten from Nepal, Lama Lodro Thaye from PJ Centre and other monks, the special event aimed to remove obstacles, improve health and benefit all sentient beings.

OOKING BEYOND

One should not consider aesthetics and convenience as basis for holding an event as momentous as a car-free day...

For the record, Ipoh's car-free day, held on the fourth Sunday of every month, is now into its third year. It began with much fanfare on Sunday, October 18, 2015 and, on conclusion of the first of such event this year, a total of 15 car free days had taken place

Why my sudden interest in this not-too-significant an event has much to do with its organisation, programming and venue. Of the three "inconsistencies", venue seems to be the most glaring, for one reason or the other.

For the past 15 months, the supposedly family-orientated event has been held at one single venue – the 1.5km stretch of road between the Jalan Hospital roundabout along Jalan Raja DiHilir, on one end, and the roundabout near the MB's residence, on the other end. This seems to be the only venue available to the organiser – Ipoh City Council. Whether the conduct of an auspicious occasion such as this requires a single and irrevocable venue is debatable. Or is it the only venue available to the Council?

Without the benefit of any reliable facts and figures, I can only make an assumption.

I feel that the 1.5km stretch of road is the most convenient locality for a trouble-free car-free day in Ipoh. I can't think of any other reasons than this. I have enquired with the Council's public relations officer but he has yet to respond. If I am puzzled, what about the rest in the city? They too must be wondering why.

Incidentally, Shah Alam held its very first car-free day on Sunday, January 22, the same day as Ipoh's. Over 1000 people attended the inaugural event which began at 7am and ended at 10am, much alike Ipoh's. The length of the route, however, was longer -5km to be exact. It was held at the Merdeka Square, Shah Alam. Residents came prepared for the occasion. Some cycled, some skated while others either walked or jogged. The route provides a good view of Shah Alam minus vehicular traffic.

Metropolitan Kuala Lumpur has its fair share of car-free days. The federal capital has been observing a car-free morning since 2014. It venue is more scenic and challenging stretching from Dataran Merdeka, opposite Selangor Club to the iconic Petronas Twin Tower in Jalan Ampang, a distance of about 8km. The reason is obvious – optimising the occasion to the very maximum.

Will a 1.5km stretch, located not within but at the inner-most fringe of the city, be the right choice? Ipoh and Perak came into prominence when both were listed among the best tourist destinations in Asia for 2016 and 2017 by Lonely Planet, the world's largest travel guide book.



EYE HEALTH — THE CLOUDY LENS

Ipoh Echo's EYE HEALTH series continues with Consultant Eye Surgeon Dr S.S. GILL talking to us about CATARACT.

ne lens in our eyes plays a crucial role in vision. This lens is transparent, crystalline and focuses light on the back of the eye (retina). When this crystalline lens becomes cloudy, it is called a cataract and this is most often seen in the aging population.

When the lens becomes a cataract, it affects vision in some way or the other, either in the loss of clarity or quality of vision. This is because cataracts block and distort the light that has to pass through the lens, causing visual symptoms.



In Malaysia, cataract is the leading cause of poor vision in patients above the age of 55 years. Cataracts usually occur very gradually although there are instances it may occur rapidly. Quite often, people may be unaware that they have cataracts because the changes in their vision have been gradual. Cataracts commonly affect both eyes, but it is not uncommon for cataracts to advance more rapidly in one eye.

What are some common causes of cataract?

Contrary to popular belief, cataract is not caused by reading or eye strain. Among the common causes

Aging: This is the commonest cause for cataracts developing. Almost every person will develop a cataract at some stage of life because everyone is constantly aging. Most individuals would have cataracts by the time they reach their seventies.

Secondary cataracts. These occur due to medical conditions, like diabetes, or due to exposure certain drugs like corticosteroids or diuretics, radiation and ultraviolet exposure. Heavy alcohol consumption is another.


Traumatic cataracts. These form as a result of an eye injury. At times the injury may have occurred much earlier and you may have even forgotten about it. If you do remember any history of trauma, it should be highlighted to your eye doctor as special precautions during surgery will need to be taken during surgery.


Blur vision in catarac Congenital cataracts. Babies are sometimes born with cataracts as a result of an infection, injury, or poor development. They may also develop during childhood - Will need URGENT treatment to avoid permanent vision

Most cataracts develop slowly and don't disturb your eyesight initially but with time, these cataracts eventually interfere with vision. In the initial treatment of cataracts in adults, stronger lighting and stronger powered spectacles may be able to help you deal with cataracts. But if the impaired vision interferes with your usual activities, you will need cataract surgery.

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Will Ipoh City Council Ever Learn?

ome on, MBI, you have the potential to improve and make a success of Visit Perak Year (VPY)

All it takes is leadership, political willpower, lots of elbow grease and stopping officials from making loads of excuses. You must listen to the general public, who are concerned, and acknowledge journalists who are merely doing their jobs, when they report shoddy work practices.

On January 1, a few visitors to the Gunung Lang recreational park, in Jalan Kuala Kangsar, Ipoh, wrote to the mainstream papers expressing their disappointment at the park's facilities.

As anyone who has visited Gunung Lang knows, the area is extremely beautiful and is accessible by a short, inexpensive boat ride, which enables them to admire the limestone hills and emerald green waters, at close range.

The holiday trippers, who wrote to the papers, said that very little had been done to improve the park in recent months and it was reported that poor maintenance left visitors reeling with anger.

Some people claimed that Gunung Lang was an eyesore; the flower pots were full of weeds, shrubs had not been pruned, grass was allowed to grow over the footpaths, some of the animal enclosures were empty, whilst the roofs of some of the buildings had been damaged.

A visitor who spent half an hour walking around the park, said that both he and his grandchildren were disappointed. He wondered why the city council had failed to maintain and upgrade the park. He said that visiting Gunung Lang was a waste of time.

Another visitor complained that the damaged structures in the park posed a safety hazard. He said that there was a lack of notices warning people to keep away from areas that were undergoing repair or construction. Metal and wood, which he believed were from ongoing construction works, were strewn about and posed a danger to visitors, especially children.

The New Straits Times Actionline reported that Zamri Man, the mayor of Ipoh, had said that the park was being upgraded in stages. He said, "We are constantly upgrading the recreational park. We need proper planning to carry out the process.

"I know it is our responsibility to ensure the park is in a good condition, to attract local and foreign tourists."

So, why does the City Council find it difficult to keep the park in good order? Is it a lack of funds, a lack of direction, a lack of knowledge, a lack of skilled labour or simply a lack of initiative?

Over the years, Ipoh Echo has highlighted the lack of maintenance at Gunung Lang (see http://www.ipohecho. com.my/v3/photo/pdf/1836 20150828105747 uqzbe.pdf and http://www.ipohecho.com.my/v4/article/2016/04/01/ potential-of-gunung-lang-park-not-tapped).

In Ipoh Echo's Issue 219, published in September 2015, editorial consultant, Jerry Francis asked why the Ipoh City Council neglected Gunung Lang and other parks in the city. He complained that the council had allowed Ipoh's four parks to deteriorate through lack of maintenance, and fall into disrepair.

Jerry wondered if the workers did not understand the meaning of "maintenance" and misunderstood the meaning of "repair". He strongly asserted that the staff, who are tasked with keeping the parks in good order, lack dedication. He did not think that a lack of manpower or resources had contributed to the terrible conditions at Gunung Lang.

We cannot blame the junior staff, who are directed to maintain the place. Blame should also be apportioned to the top, principally their bosses and the mayor. The stories of unkempt parks have plagued Ipohites since the parks were opened.

Where is the leadership? What happened to accountability and responsibility? Many senior staff have been sent abroad on study trips, but they seem to have learnt nothing on these expensive so-called-educational visits to other places. These trips are a waste of taxpayers' money.

I, too, have complained about Gunung Lang. In August 2011, I brought a large party of local and foreign visitors to visit this green lung of Ipoh, and it was a shameful experience, having boasted to my friends about the beauty of the place.

Rubbish was strewn everywhere. The animals were dehydrated, so my visitors felt compelled to find a hose pipe and put water into the animals' troughs. Some of the

rabbits were very diseased and appeared to be on their last legs. Their fur was falling off, some were panting in the heat and the rabbit enclosure was covered in a one inch layer of rabbit pellets.

In 2011 I said, "Why has the mayor allowed such terrible practices to continue? Is he not aware that Visit Perak Year (VPY) 2012 is just around the corner? If improvements are not made, the foreign visitors will say that Malaysia is a nation which ill-treats its animals.'

In 2017, it seems that history has repeated itself. VPY 2017 has started and we have a new mayor, but the terrible practices continue.

So, will the Ipoh City Council learn its lesson? Will it listen to the people, who only want the council to be a bit more responsible? Will the mayor stop making excuses and start acting responsibly?

Adenotonsilitis in Children

What are Adenoids and Tonsils?

An adenoid is a lymphoid tissue between the back of the nose and the throat. Tonsils are two small masses of lymphoid tissue one on each side of the root of the tongue.

What is Adenotonsilitis?

Adenotonsillitis is the inflammation of the tonsils and adenoids.

What Causes Adenotonsilitis?

Adenotonsilitis is caused by a viral or bacterial infection. Adenovirus Influenza Virus, Parainfluenza and Streptococcus species of bacteria are the commonest organisms involved.

How is Adenonsilitis Spread to Other People?

The virus and bacteria that cause Adenotonsilitis are airborne and thus easily spread to other What are the Signs and Symptoms of Adenotonsilitis?

The symptoms are fever, sore throat, swollen tonsils that are red and may have white spots on them. This is associated with coughing, headache, and swollen lymph nodes. At times children may have nausea, vomiting, hoarseness, and bad breath.

If there is adenoiditis as well, children have blocked nose, nasal discharge, snoring and mouth breathing.

In the event the tonsils and adenoids are very large and obstruct (block) the airway, the child may have a sudden difficulty to breathe while she is asleep. This suddenly awakens her. This phenomenon is called Obstructive Sleep Apnoea


How is Adenotonsilitis Diagnosed?


Your child's doctor will ask her symptoms and examine her to make a diagnosis.


How is Adenotonsilitis Treated?


Taking paracetamol or ibuprofen helps to reduce fever and pain. Gargle and/ or lozenges help to reduce pain in older children. Encourage her to drink plenty of fluids and rest. At times symptomatic treatment for cough, blocked nose and nasal discharge may be needed.

If bacterial infection is suspected, a course of antibiotics is given. If this treatment does not settle the fever and sore throat than the child will need to be admitted into hospital for intravenous









Most of the time, adenotonsillitis gets better within a week. However, a small number of children have tonsillitis for longer, or it keeps returning. Thus surgical treatment may be

In this situation your doctor will refer you to an Ear Nose and Throat Specialist.

What are the Complications of Adenotonsilitis?

Sometimes complications arise as a result of adenotonsilitis and it is mainly after a bacterial

The possible complications are:

- Middle ear infection known as Otitis Media where the fluid between the eardrum and inner ear becomes infected by bacteria.
- A collection of pus develops between one of the tonsils and the wall of the throat. This is called peritonsillar abscess or Quinsy.

Rarer complications are:

- Obstructive sleep apnoea (as explained earlier)
- Glomerulonephritis 10 to 14 days after streptococcal tonsillitis. This occurs as a result of the body's immune system's reaction to the infection.

SeeFoon seeks out auspicious food for Chinese New Year

This is the season for that delightful Chinese tradition of welcoming the new year with "Loh Hei" or the Prosperity Toss, the tossing of various ingredients symbolic of auspicious qualities that we pray will come our way. Not only is the ritual a wonderful form of fellowship as friends and families stand around the table lifting the ingredients with their chopsticks (Chinese salad tossing!) but as they voice the various chants of 'good business' 'good health' 'smooth sailing' 'good results', the camaraderie and ambiance generated are wonderfully uplifting.

And this is a dish that allows for a huge amount of creativity as to the ingredients. As long as there is the raw fish, *Yu Sang* (representing growth, abundance), other ingredients can be as interesting as the chef wishes it to be. The ritual is to toss the mixed ingredients high in the air with a shout of "*Loh Hei*" which literally means to "move upwards". It is symbolic of the wish for our fortunes to rise and expand during the forthcoming year.

I recently had the pleasure to enjoy my first prosperity toss in anticipation of Chinese New Year at one of my favourite restaurants, **Crab House** in Ipoh Garden East. Fanny who is my 'go-to' person whenever I make a booking at Crab House, and her partner Ah Sing who helms the kitchen, are very creative and diligent about coming out with new dishes to tempt the jaded palates of their regulars.



For this coming celebratory season their *Yu Sang* has an added ingredient: fried fish skin. Together with the raw salmon and added pomelo, plus all the other must-haves like julienned carrots, white and green radish, sesame seeds, crushed peanuts, fried crisps and plum sauce, the resultant 'salad' has a taste and texture that is utterly yummilicious with the fish skin adding the extra crunch. **RM48 small; RM68 large with salmon and fish skin; RM38 with salmon only.**

Aside from all the usual goodies on offer at Crab House, (written about in issues 152 and 222) while you're there, make a note to order another new dish which is their **salted-egg-yolk-encrusted fish skin** served with a mayo mixed salad of carrots and jicama. Crunchy, crispy and crackling.

Continuing my search for auspicious foods for Chinese New Year, I went in search of fresh steamed fish which as we all know, can be exorbitant in most restaurants especially at this time of the year. In Chinese, fish "Yú" sounds like 'surplus' and to have a surplus augurs well for the rest of the year. Hence the wish for "nyen-nyen yo yoo" meaning "May you always have more than you need" is a familiar greeting during this period. And most people dining out during this season will always insist on fish.



for a change of price and pace, yet attracting all auspiciousness

for the coming year, do go to **Restaurant 226** in Chemor and have their **Steamed Chili Fish**. It is a ramshackle coffee shop about 300m from the traffic light intersection at Jalan Jelapang and Jalan Chemor. Their Steamed Chili Fish is worth the drive as is their price.

Known as the Fei Tsao
Yu (African fish) this stall
stocks live black Tilapia
most of which are at least
2kg in size. At RM20 per
kg, plus a cooking fee added,
we had a 2kg-plus fish recently





that was steamed to perfection. This was butterflied, and done *yin yang* style with one side topped with ginger and the other side with the addition of black beans (*Dao Tse*). Amy, the young lady who served us, explained that their ginger topping is not blended but rather chopped fine which makes a big difference in taste. Plus their use of *Bentong* ginger lends another dimension of flavour. Despite its size, the fish was tender and steamed to just the right degree of doneness. **RM50** for a fish that was too much for five of us.

The whole purpose for coming here is for the fish but one can have accompanying vegetables with it as well as browse some of the other stalls for other nibbles. Try the braised chicken feet from a neighbouring stall selling *yeong liew*.

For me just the fish is enough "raison d'etre" for the drive.

Temple by the River, Sui Yuet Goong

Built for the use of his family, a former tin miner with the surname of Soo built the Sui Yuet Goong (palace) in 1878. What is unique about this Taoist temple is that it is located near a river. In fact, the direct translation for Sui Yuet is 'Nearby the water'.

"Back in those days, most of tin miners were immigrants. To get to Tanah Melayu (Malaysia) they had to take boats. As a sign of



gratitude for arriving safely, the immigrants decided to built a temple and pray," said Tang Ngan Chai, the caretaker of the temple, as the reason for its name.

Although it was for private use, more and more devotees would come by and that was when the temple was open to the public. Devotees who come would pray to the Goddess of Mercy, Guan Yin.

"In here, believers pray to Guan Yin for good luck, health and prosperity. They come to the temple and buy the prayer sticks we provide in the temple and everyone is more than welcome to donate to the temple, regardless of what amount," added Tang.

Open everyday from 7.30am till 4pm, Sui Yuet Goong celebrates the day Goddess



of Mercy, Guan Yin became a saint, that falls on the 19th day of the second month in the lunar calendar. During the day, devotees will come and pray to the deity. The temple will also extend their opening hours on these days to give devotees a longer time to pray.

Sui Yuet Goong is located at **Jalan Kampong Jawa**, **30000 Ipoh** (opposite Seri Kinta Building).

Watt Siribunya Maggarama

att Siribunya Maggarama is a well-known Thai Buddhist temple situated along Jalan Raja Dihilir. It used to be a small temple until it expanded gradually before the passing of its Chief Abbot, PhraKu Virat. Chief Abbot refers to the monk who holds the administrator position in a Buddhist monastery.

The temple is more than 120 years old though the founder of it remains a mystery. Lord Buddha's altar is placed inside the Main Shrine Hall Vihara, with a backdrop of a mural painting. The devotees who go to this temple pray to Lord Buddha.

"We receive the most visitors during Chinese New Year and every first and fifteenth of the month according to the Chinese calendar," said Teh Cheng Chai, one of the helpers at the temple.

According to beliefs, the first and fifteenth

day of the lunar month are said to be auspicious days. Thus, the merits would be multiplied many fold if they were to practise good deeds. That's why devotees make great offerings and pray for their blessings and prosperity.

Recently, the temple was overwhelmed with people during the passing of Thailand's





King Bhumibol Adulyadej. They all came to pay homage to the King as he was greatly loved by all.

Open every day from 7am till 6pm, everybody is welcome to visit and have a look at the majestic structures of the temple. It is situated at: 89-90, Jalan Raja Dihilir, 30350 Ipoh, Perak.

Paloh Khoo Miu Temple

ne hidden gem that Ipoh Echo has discovered is the Paloh Khoo Miu Temple, a burst of rainbow colours that leap out right behind People's Park. The Taoist temple was built in 1872 by prominent tin miner cum philanthropist, Leong Fee and was gazetted as a place of worship in 1894 by the British Colonial Government. Thus, it is one of the oldest Chinese temples in Perak. Its name is derived from what Ipoh was fondly known back then as, "Paloh". The main feature of the single-storey holy place is dedicated to Tai Pak Koong, the God of Blessing and Ethics.

Born in the Mei Xian district in Guangdong Province of China, Leong Fee came to Ipoh by river from Penang. He brought with him the spirit of the deity with burning joss sticks from a temple in Hai Zhu Island near Penang and founded the temple alongside the Kinta River to give thanks for safe arrival. In 1894, Leong Fee and Yau Tet Shin, another famous miner, entrepreneur and pioneer of Ipoh, successfully applied to the British

Colonial Government for a piece of land to build the temple at its present site.

After the Japanese Occupation, Lau Pak Khuan, later to become the first Chinese Dato' Seri, was elected as the chairman of the board of governors in charge of reviving the temple and laying the foundation of the present temple as it stands today.

Driving through a decorated archway, visitors can park in the designated lots in the temple grounds. One will be greeted by a pair of auspicious stone sentry lions guarding its main entrance. Upon entering, its sunlit main hall is flanked by the eight bronze ceremonial weaponry. Equally impressive are the century-old joss stick holders at the altar.

At the altar of Tai Pak Koong is an intricate wooden carving covered with antique gold leaf, a standing testament of how devotees have put their hearts and souls and hard earned money to honour the deity.

Meanwhile, the yard houses a dragon squirting water from his wishing pond flanked by two carp-filled ponds, adding to the serenity. The ringing of the 124-year-old copper centennial bell and drum each time an offering is made together with the bubbling water create a soothing tone that encourages introspection.

Paloh Khoo Miu Temple receives the most number of visitors during Chinese New Year Eve and the birthday of Tai Pak Koong, which falls on February 16 of the lunar calendar. The latter is an annual grand affair which lasts for days and nights to thank the deity for his blessings.

Consumers Encouraged to Report Overpriced Groceries

t has become the norm to see grocery prices hiked up during the festival season in Malaysia. Despite authorities' efforts to control the hikes, many business owners choose to disobey the law.

"Few days ago, we managed to catch three owners who not only hiked their prices but also didn't display the prices," said the Minister of the Ministry of Domestic Trade, Co-operative and Consumerism, Dato's Seri Hamzah Zainudin at Econsave Ampang, Ipoh on January 24 recently.

Hamzah and his entourage paid a visit to Ipoh's Wet Market at the Urban Transformation Centre (UTC) Ipoh and Econsave Supermarket in Ampang to check the prices of certain controlled items such as eggs, chicken, garlic and prawns. It was during the visit that Hamzah advised consumers to be smart when choosing groceries.

"Take chocolate malt drinks for example. If you feel the price is too expensive, perhaps it is time to opt for another brand. There are cheaper options like Econsave's chocolate malt drink with the taste similar to the more expensive brands," added

Hamzah also reminded business owners to follow the prices recommended by the authority or they may be charged or worse, jailed.

"According to the Price Control and Anti-Profiteering Act 2011 (AKHAP), any





individual found guilty selling controlled items beyond the allocated prices can either be sentenced to at least three years in jail or charged with a RM100,000 fine or both," said Hamzah. Ili Aqilah

Are Malaysian Parents Inadvertently Supporting Paedophiles?

The recent horrific paedophile exposure in Malaysia has made some aware of the extensive nature and risk to children of these perverted individuals. Unfortunately many parents, including professionals, have made little change in their lives to protect their children. They remain blasé (unmoved) as to the threat and continue to expose their children and families to this danger. Kindly allow me to give one clear example.

Many parents happily post images of their children on social media – on Facebook and Twitter or use their child's image as a profile image on WhatsApp or WeChat, etc. This provides a rich source of images of children for paedophiles to access and use. One Australian study found that 50% of all images used by websites frequented and maintained by paedophiles came from social media sites.

I see a significant number of my paediatric colleagues, who should know better (having seen numerous child abuse cases), also behaving in the same unsafe way. As Malaysians we are offering paedophiles a 'supermarket' of our children's images to browse and access. Paedophiles are not just interested in pictures of naked children but also get aroused by pictures of cute children, even when dressed. These images are then re-posted on paedophile websites and shared with other perverts, some of whom will masturbate looking at our children (horrible just thinking of it). The biggest danger will of course be the hard-core individuals who will use this easy access to identify children to target for actual physical contact and sexual abuse. This is easy given the largely unlimited access many parents give to children to social media via their hand phones and easy internet access. One study we did at CRC Perak, of Malaysian 2 year olds in 2015, showed that more that 60% had unsupervised access to internet via hand phones or tablets; older children have even greater access. A large proportion of children I have met in my clinical practice also have their own Facebook accounts despite being less than 12 years of age.

Are Malaysian parents ignorant or just plain careless? This includes medical professionals. The world is rapidly changing and we need to change to support our children. This fascination with sharing our images online, especially those of our children, must stop.

Some recommendations for us all to protect our children:

- Do not use your child's or family photo (which includes children) as a profile image for any social media application or site.
- 2. Do not post images of your child online on Facebook, Twitter or other 'open' social media sites. If you need to share with family then restrict access to such images on the site or, better

still, use closed groups like the Telegram app.

- 3. Do not post pictures of your child in any state of undress (shorts, swimwear, etc).
- 4. Do not disclose your home location/address or child's school location online.
- 5. Discuss basic online safety rules with your children periodically.
- 6. Monitor your child's access and use of the internet and social media sites.
- 7. Limit your child's access to Facebook and other social network sites. Make sure they are mature enough before they use such sites.
- 8. Parents should also limit their own time on social media site and hand phone usage.

Setting an example for our children is vital. Be emotionally and spiritually in touch with your children rather than be connected electronically.

One day, when your child is an adult, they may ask you why their childhood images are being circulated and used online by dubious individuals. There is no return, no way to remove, any image shared on line once it has been re-shared or downloaded. Internet control has limitations, thus parents need to take action and play their part.

UMNO: Then and Now

Perak Academy kick started 2017 with a lecture entitled, "UMNO: Then and Now" as their first talk of the year. Presented by Professor Clive Kessler, it was held at Symphony Suites & Hotel on Tuesday, January 10.

The enlightening evening began with a moment's silence for the late Professor Lee Poh Ping. Lee was formerly a professor of history and international relations at the University of Malaya. One of the best known academicians in the area of international relations, he spoke on "The World after September 11" in 2002 during a lecture hosted by Perak Academy.

Clive Kessler, an Australian, is an emeritus professor of sociology and anthropology at the University of New South Wales, Sydney. He has been researching and writing about the politics of resurgent and militant Islam in Southeast Asia and globally, for half a century. Most recently, he has published a treatise titled, "UMNO: Then, Now – and Always?"

The insightful and erudite discussion, attended by over 60 people, was moderated by 66-year-old Zaira bin Tak, an UMNO stalwart and brother of the late Dato' Azumu bin Tak

Clive spoke on the heroic exploits by UMNO formative members in 1946: the UMNO of *Hidup Melayu* and now *Ketuanan Melayu*; and the UMNO of 1951, and especially 1955 to 1957: the UMNO of constructive inter-ethnic conciliation and compromise, the UMNO of modern, inclusive, progressive democratic nation-building.

"UMNO has a continuing veto power over Malaysian politics. Do UMNO and its leaders now see it as a responsibility or some kind of a perpetual right?" asked Clive.

"So, does UMNO need to change? Yes. Can it change? Perhaps. Will it? I fear not. Does it even want to? I doubt it, not yet anyway.

"The two classic yet pertinent questions now are: one, what is to be done, and the other, what is the way forward?" he added.



In retrospect, the changing of the political party's declaration from "Hidup Melayu" to "Ketuanan Melayu" forms the basis of the party's and, perhaps, its members' mindset.

Chan Kok Keong, deputy chairman of the Perak Academy, hosted the event while Harold Kong emceed.

Perak Dominated in Taekwon-Do Championship

team comprising of total 26 players representing Perak participated in the National Taekwon-Do (ITF) Championship 2016 held by First City University College from December 16-18, 2016.

The opening ceremony of this national event was officiated by Dato' Seri Mohamed Azmin Bin Ali, the Chief Minister of Selangor.

Perak state players gave a highly impressive performance, dominating as the overall state champion throughout the events, and also seized both best male and best female awards in this championship. Perak state harvested a total of 27 medals, comprising eight golds, four silvers, and 15 bronzes. Among the total of eight golds, best male award winner Loo Wai Sing and best female award winner Vivian Tan won their own two golds in both individual pattern and sparring events. Poh Keng Chong who competed in male 4th Dan individual pattern, Goh Rui Min who took part in female 3rd Dan individual pattern, and Yong Chin Yip who participated in male 2nd Dan individual pattern achieved gold medals in their respective events. 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


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
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
