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ver the last three years or so, many international newspapers and magazines waxed lyrical about the Ipoh and how it was changing. They dubbed it the "Ipoh Renaissance". At this point it is necessary to see what they meant, and to do so we turn to the dictionary, which defines renaissance as: Either the culture and style of art and architecture developed during the Renaissance; or a revival of or renewed interest in something. Obviously they were not suggesting that we had transformed Ipoh into the architecture and culture of the 14th century, but simply meant that there seemed to be a greater interest in Ipoh than ever before. In plain language they meant that Ipoh and particularly Old Town were experiencing a tourism boom. This boom can be best understood by the statistics; today there are 634 choices of visitor accommodation in and around Ipoh, according to "Hotels Combined".

A Town in Disarray

o what has this sudden influx of people done to our Old Town, the heart of Ipoh's history? In one word, they have 'destroyed' it! They have taken away its charm, history and living heritage, replacing it with daily traffic jams, hotels, cafes, double parking, and a galaxy of cheap tourist shops/stalls; the latter selling a wide range of 'small eats', imported toys and clothing, temple items and even second-hand cars being sold from public parking spaces! Add to that the crumbling murals, overcrowded, broken walkways, the (in many cases) unregulated hawkers blocking pavements and parking spaces, children's 'Games of Chance' machines and you can start to get the picture of a town out of control. Is it any wonder that our tourists are mainly Malaysians who spend as little as possible in what they call "Ipoh Cheapoh"? These are not the so-called 'Tourist Dollars' we need to build up our town, but we shall never see the overseas tourists we hope for, unless something is here to attract them. Why would any visitor from overseas want to buy imported junk?

In order to cater for this sudden explosion of local tourists many building owners have transformed their properties overnight with minimum expenditure and paying little or no attention to preserving the heritage aspects of the town, while making, we believe, maximum profit with minimum outlay. Good business if you can get it! But let us consider the longer term: without effective maintenance and preservation these old buildings will continue to deteriorate until one day they will simply collapse (it has happened before) or have to be demolished. On the other end of the property scale are those buildings that are already beyond straightforward repair. A quick makeover job is far too expensive for these and so they are left to rot. Two sets of tourists from overseas have already expressed their concern to us about the safety of our Old Town tourist areas and decided to return to their hotel. What sort of reputation is that to be painted with? What message will they spread when they get home?

What Old Town Needs

So who is responsible and what can be done; or is it too late? Of course not! What Old Town needs is some basic governmental control. A few months ago many local people saw the dramatic change in the political climate as a golden ray of hope for Ipoh and its future. The new State Government team is younger and appear to be more enthusiastic than those dyed-in-the-wool, long-term politicians who occupied their offices before them. These are the new breed of politician with technology at their fingertips and all the vigour of youth that their new role should bring. Five years is a short time to hold power and if they wish to hold on to it they must get to work now.




So what have they done so far? Well, the *Sama Sama* programme ran for a month and it was a good attempt at getting the community together, but it is time that those in authority realise that not everybody uses Facebook or Twitter. Sometimes old-fashioned methods are still the best. If they had arranged for better publicity, several of the events would have been a more solid success than they turned out to be. Apart from that, there does not seem to have been any positive step to cure the blatant ills of our hometown. Sure, there had been suggestions of some sort of exhibition centre, an art gallery, and a couple of Waller court blocks to be landscaped and turned into small 'start-up units, but surely this is missing the point entirely. Before we create other possible 'White Elephants' like the Darul Ridzuan Museum, (which ranks as 59 out of 65 Ipoh attractions on TripAdvisor), sensibly we should be trying to put right what we already have in our city. May I suggest that our excos and councillors pay an unscheduled surprise visit to Old Town one Sunday and see the chaos for themselves? We would be happy to guide them.

It is definitely chic to lace one's speech with some Arabsounding words although they may mean little or nothing to both speakers and listeners. The absurdity is getting a little out of hand, I dare say. But to the adherents this is God-sent.

The troubled interfaith relations prevalent today is the result of this exclusivist Wahhabi/Salafist thinking which has crept into the education curriculum and mindset. Renowned Muslim scholars are labelled "secular" and "liberal" to keep the

so plentiful and obvious that even the most cynical can no longer dismiss them as inconsequential.

The Islamic scholar implored that the new Pakatan Harapan Government take precautionary measures to arrest the spread before things get out of hand.

Before the situation becomes untenable like what is happening in Afghanistan and Pakistan, it's better to nip the problem in the bud. We need to do whatever possible to see it done. Revamping the school curriculum is one possible way to correct the situation,"

Islam preaches compassion, love and tolerance but what we see in the Middle East, Pakistan and Afghanistan is something else. All of those benign virtues associated with Islam are being systematically destroyed by people who use religion for their very own selfish ends. I concur with the academician that religious extremism has no place in a multi-ethnic and multi-cultural Malaysia.

The radicalisation of Islam in Malaysia, incidentally, did not happen in a few short years. It is like an underground fire that is fueled by methane gas. You don't see the flame but the burning continues and the heat permeates through the vents. It becomes volatile and deadly once the flames reach the surface and start to engulf the surrounding. This is the scenario I can think of.

According to Fauzi, Islamic theology taught in government schools in the early 1990s has shifted from traditional to one derived from the Middle East, especially from Saudi Arabia. The views are one-sided, sidestepping the norms while embracing a more radical form of mindset, one of exclusivity, supremacist, with diminishing respect for the practitioners of other religions. Thus minorities and those with differing views are considered "aliens" or "non-conformists."

The term "liberalism" is often bandied about. If being a Muslim and you don't conform you are a "liberal" and is regarded an outcast destined to burn in hell. The naivety is simply mind-blowing. The only similarity I can allude to is the Inquisition in 12th century France which later spread to Spain and Portugal. The objective of the Inquisitors was to "combat dissent and public heresy committed by baptised Christians." And the targeted groups were mainly converts who were erroneously labelled as suspects due to the "assumption that they had secretly reverted to their former religions."

Incidentally, the last public execution of the Inquisition was in Spain in 1826 when a school teacher was garroted (strangled) for being a disbeliever and attempting to spread his belief to his students.

Things were definitely different, pre and post Merdeka in 1957. And being someone from that era I can safely vouch for it. In 1979, following the Iranian Revolution that helped catapult Ayatollah Khomeini into power, the equation changed dramatically. The revolution sparked interest in Islam all over the world.

Iran is a proponent of the Syiah form of Islam which is strongly opposed by the Sunnis in other parts of the Muslim world led by Saudi Arabia. The oil-rich Saudi government, in wanting to counter the spread of Syiah teachings, took advantage of this change offering scholarships and money to institutions and charities in the developing Muslim world. Malaysia was one of the many beneficiaries.

This, the Saudis believe, would help impose their brand of conservative Islam popularly referred to as Wahhabism or Salafism within their area of influence, including Malaysia.

In the 1980s and 1990s many Malaysians, especially Malay Muslims, went overseas for higher education. Due to the interest in Islam, many headed to the Middle East especially Saudi Arabia, Jordan and Egypt to pursue religious studies. This was made possible by the generous scholarships offered by the Saudi Arabian government. Over there they were exposed to the Wahhabi/Salafist way of thinking and practices.

When these students returned they got into the mainstream education system and becoming the ideal source for the Wahhabi/Salafist way of thinking which preaches intolerance, extremism and exclusivity. Some gained entry into the civil service, becoming influential bureaucrats, lawyers, academicians and politicians. These people are now in positions of power thus allowing them to make decisions for the good and bad of all of us. That explains why the thinking of these "misfits" are so skewed.

Wahhabism was started by Muhammad Abd al-Wahhab (1703-1792) who was dismayed by what he saw in Istanbul. The Ottoman Turks' way of life, he reasoned, was revolting. He then decided to propagate his version of "a pure and unadulterated Islam."

The "Arabisation" of Malay Muslims has accelerated over the years. Today "uncovered" women are a rarity. And if you do meet them they are among the few who dare to be different. To the diehard believers, this phenomenon is the result of the proliferation liberalism that corrodes their way of life. The traditional yet alluring kebaya modern, the choice dress of my mother and aunties in the 1950s right to 1970s, had given way to the drab and soulless "tudung" and "telekung" which are designed to conceal the female figure.

Male members are more adept at sporting a goatee and wearing a skullcap, as this is deemed appropriate and in sync with the dress code of Wahhabis. The more Arab one looks and talks, help to improve one's religious credentials. It is about being as close as what was witnessed in 6^{th} century Mecca and Madinah.

So "selamat pagi" becomes "assalamualaikum" and "akhirat" becomes "jannah".

Muslim masses from hearing them out. Those who do not toe the line are banned from speaking out. Fatwas (religious edicts) issued are seldom explained. Questioning a fatwa is considered blasphemous.

Notwithstanding the brouhaha surrounding the controversial Department of Islamic Development (Jakim), no solutions are yet forthcoming. Funding for the department's many questionable activities has never been accounted for.

Where will all this lead us to? Your guess is as good as mine. With the emergence of Malaysia Baru (New Malaysia) this inadequacy will be addressed in due course. But looking at what's been happening, I have my doubts.

Hopefully, I will be proven wrong.

EYE HEALTH – SWIMMING WITH CONTACT LENSES

Ipoh Echo's EYE HEALTH series continues with Consultant Eye Surgeon Dr S.S. GILL talking to us about SWIMMING WITH CONTACT LENSES ON.

ost people these days prefer not wearing spectacles to correct short-sightedness and other refractive errors. Contact lenses is a good option whether for cosmetic or sports reasons.

Play a sport with contact lenses on, exercise with them and work with them but NEVER ever swim with them on! Swimming with contact lenses on should be avoided whether it is swimming in lakes, sea, swimming pools or hot tubs.

Firstly, take note that soft contact lenses are hydrophilic in nature, meaning that they absorb water in order to keep soft.

This is so that the contact lenses will allow oxygen to permeate through to the cornea of our eyes. Essentially, soft contact lenses are much like a sponge, absorbing whatever solutions they are placed in. The water content makes it easy for the bacteria to get absorbed into the contact lens and mind you, all forms of water that you may swim or dip in are often full of organisms including your bathtub. Do not be misled into thinking that the chlorine in the water would destroy every sort of organism and take note that wearing goggles do not guarantee that water will not get into your eyes.

ACANTHAMOEBA KERATITIS

One dreaded eye infection for a contact lens wearer swimming with contact lenses on is an eye infection called Acanthamoeba Keratitis. Acanthamoeba is the organism and keratitis means corneal inflammation.

This organism is found in many different kinds of water including sometimes tap water, often when the source is from stored water (water tank). Acanthamoeba Keratitis is a serious debilitating and painful eve infection (corneal ulcer) that can cause blindness.



FEATURES:

Accompanying the eye redness, photophobia, blurred vision and profuse tearing is pain that is often quite severe even after the contact lenses are removed. Acanthamoeba Keratitis is often difficult to treat and runs a prolonged course. The infected person runs a high risk of permanent loss of vision in the infected eye, so do seek urgent treatment.

GENERAL POINTERS FOR CONTACT LENS WEARERS TO NOTE:

Here are some general points to note if you are contact lens wearer.

- 1. Firstly, avoid swimming with contact lenses on!
- 2. Always wash your hands with soap (moisturizer-free soap) before handling contacts
- 3. Use proper disinfecting lens solutions if you wear monthly disposable contacts.
- 4. Change the storage case of your contact lenses frequently.
- 5. Apply makeup on your eyes only after you have worn your contact lenses.
- 6. Remove lenses the moment you experience any irritation, redness or eye discharge.
- 7. Bring along the last worn contact lenses (before you had eye problems) to the doctor in case send they need to be sent to the laboratory for organisms to be identified.
- 8. Finally, remember never ever to take shortcuts in caring for your contact lenses.

If you are in doubt about any contact lens related eye problems, always seek professional help.

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

PAS and PH in Perak are competing for the men's affection

n the battle for the hearts and minds of the electorate, the Perak Pakatan Harapan (PH) administration appears to want to compete with at a party. He was much older than me, .PAS, to woo Muslim males.

On October 31, having launched the Perak Islamic Religious Council's matchmaking website and Module on Understanding Polygamy in Perak, the State Executive councillor, Asmuni Awi, announced that the Perak government planned to amend Section 23 of the Islamic Family Enactment (Perak) 2004. The move would make it easier for Muslim men to enter into a polygamous marriage.

Asmuni said, "Some wives agree to allow their husbands to be polygamous, but do not like to appear in court. So the amendments will give the court the discretion whether to call the wife or not when arriving at a decision."

Muslim men already find it easy to marry again, with or without their first wives' permission. Why not be creative and help single mothers and abandoned wives, instead?

Last March, the Perak PAS information chief, Wan Tarmizi Abd Aziz, suggested that women should celebrate International Women's Day by consenting to polygamy. He said, "Women's Day will be more meaningful if a woman gifts (sic) another woman to her spouse, as a mark of appreciation of other women.'

Have the leaders of these two parties, lost their senses? Why should women agree to polygamy? It is always about the Muslim man. Haven't they been pampered enough, given all sorts of handouts and opportunities, but still make a mess of their lives?

difficult to make ends meet. Muslim single mothers who go through the Syariah courts face an uphill battle to get alimony and maintenance for the children, and yet Asmuni thinks it is better to help Muslim men marry again and create even more single mothers.

Will he and his boss, the Menteri Besar, Ahmad Faizal Azumu, get their priorities right?

Why have the other component coalition members of PH, like DAP and PKR, kept quiet? Why are the NGOs and family organisations not protesting against this irresponsible ruling?

Perakians who voted in GE-14 wanted change – real change and not just cosmetic changes or daft policies, which only help to further destroy our society. They did not vote for a new administration which will make it on the table. easier for already married Muslim men to marry again. They also wanted an end to corruption, cronyism, bigotry, extremism, injustice and abuse of power.

Don't the Muslim leaders in Perak, read? Have they no idea about the divorce statistics and the numbers of single women, and wives whose husbands refuse to grant them a divorce, but do not contribute towards the upkeep of the family home and the children. There are also the women who have been left high and dry, by their errant ex-husbands.


Did they not read about the two women in Terengganu, both divorced and single mothers who were forced to prostitute themselves to provide for themselves and their children. Instead of forcing the men to provide for these women, the women were whipped. What kind of justice is this?

Why are the Muslim politicians, in government, treating the Muslim men in their electorate like spoilt brats and pampered pooches? If the truth be told, some Muslim men simply waltz from one marital bed to another. Some don't even have a decent job or any job at all. They just marry a working woman and live off her.

Here is the story of a polygamous wife. Her name has been changed to protect the innocent.

"...Our romance was fun. We met but I did not mind. Men of my age are immature, and they only want to have their bit of fun, but Nik did not rush into things. In fact, I panicked, in case he ended our relationship.

As he was much older, and already a working man, I enjoyed our dinner dates. They were at proper restaurants, and it



Our courtship was like an adventure. He did not tell me he was married, at first. I found out by accident, much later on. He was always giving me presents and liked to spoil me. We would fly off on short holidays in neighbouring countries.

He said he was waiting for the right time to divorce his wife, so I was patient. But I forgot to take my birth control pills on one romantic weekend away so when I told him I was pregnant, he was furious. So I reminded him to divorce his wife, so we could start a new life together. He stormed out and did not contact me for several days.

He told me to pack, and that we would marry in Thailand, and that he would sort out the papers on our return.

That is how I became his third wife. We have a 19-month-old baby, Muslim women, who are abandoned by their husbands, find it and as I cannot work and stay at home to look after the kid, he said that I have become boring, unattractive and a nag, because I complain that he is always away with his other wives and children.

Today, I found that he has met another, younger woman. I should have realised that he was a serial womaniser. I want a divorce, but he said he has nothing to give me, and yet I find he has money to buy a new car, and take holidays abroad. I know this from his Facebook profile.

I spoke to some of my divorced friends, and they said that they gave up trying to get alimony for themselves and maintenance for their children. The Syariah courts were not helpful. I think clever lawyers help the men find loopholes, so they can hide, and evade payments.

Many of my friends scrape by with two or three jobs, just to put food

I think that marrying is made too easy for the Malay man. A new marriage, for them, is like changing clothes. When he is fed up with the garment, he does not even bother to launder it, he just changes it for a new one. That is how it is with us wives. The husband just finds a new woman, without being responsible for his former wives.

If former husbands were forced to pay alimony, or else face jail, or have their assets seized and liquidated to pay for alimony and maintenance, they might think twice about marrying again.

I also think about the sons in these families. They have no role models and grow up thinking that they can be equally irresponsible as their fathers who are seldom around...'

So, when will the politicians in Perak's PH be courageous and help the women, instead of helping to create more polygamous husbands? These men, and their philandering ways have contributed to a broken society, and many broken homes.

public forum on Conservation **Tropical** Biodiversity was organised by UTAR conjunction in International with Conference on Tropical Biodiversity at Tower Regency Hotel. Three speakers spoke on different aspects of conservation.



First speaker, scientist Dr Gathorne Gathorne-Hardy, 5th Earl of Cranbrook, recipient of the Merdeka Award, had worked in Malaya in 1956. He was a civil servant in UK and shared his experience on how to get the government to implement conservation policies. He added that the ministers have power and authority to implement laws, but they do not like to be advised. You have to speak their language to convince them and when the minister comes up with a policy you must praise him for his brilliant idea.

Second speaker Dr. Ahimsa Campos-Arceiz, Associate Professor, University of Nottingham Malaysia Campus is a conservation ecologist. He informed the attendees on how elephants and other animals play their role in conservation of the forest and are not destructive as portrayed.

Third speaker Dr Chan Jin Hooi, Senior Lecturer, University of

Greenwich, UK explained how Virtual Reality can be used to preserve biodiversity and gave an example of how the technology was used to stop building a dam in Brazil.

Students from Tenby International School were invited to the forum. The younger generation were told the importance of preserving biodiversity. Our survival depends on it.

The Battle Of The Chefs 2018, a Penang State Signature Competition Event organised by the Penang Chefs Association which was held in early October in the Setia Spice Arena, attracted over 1500 participants from all the neighbouring countries with the furthest away being Pakistan.

This was the 17th edition of the battle which is held every two years and chefs in teams or individually battled it out from 7am-8pm over three days. Each entry was given 45 minutes to cook two dishes and a panel of judges tasted and voted.

Ipohites can be proud of four competitive teams; three of whom brought home gold medals while the fourth brought home a bronze.

In this issue I wish to congratulate two of these and share with my dear readers their winning entries.

Artisan Handmade Bread

first raved about Artisan Handmade Bread a few years ago for his delectably crusty


bread reminiscent of what I would eat in Europe, led by Sam Lau with his acolyte Kew Zong Yang, brought home a gold for his winning entry of Lor Mi Fan (our famous Dim Sum Special of steamed glutinous rice given a creative Fusion twist).

Sam, who has been promoting his **Bistronomy** cuisine ever since he opened his Cafe on Market St., has had the good fortune to discover a few good talents in the culinary students he tutors, one of whom is Kew Zong Yang, who created this fusion dish that won the gold.

A very complex recipe indeed requiring many steps of

culinary wizardry. Essentially a Ballotine of chicken stuffed with a fungus filling, served with glutinous rice in Asian flavours, an egg crepe, soy caviar, vegetables, Milan sweet potato sauce, spring onion oil, sous vide yolk and a confit of chicken wing seasoned with western herbs like thyme and bay leaf. While the ingredients of this whole composition are primarily Asian, the cooking methods as in **sous vide** and **confit** are western and makes for an interesting curation.

rew Skills International is a culinary school in Ipoh, recognised as a quality culinary education provider by the World Association of Chefs Societies (Worldchefs), a global network of chefs associations founded in 1928 in Paris, by the venerable Auguste Escoffier who espoused global training methods for cooks. Awarded the citation in November last year, it was a first for Perak and the fourth in Malaysia, thus putting Crew Skills International on the map and ranking it with institutions such as Taylor's, Sunway, Berjaya and KDU.

Now they can add a bronze medal

from the **Battle of the Chefs 2018** to their list of accolades and gain more trust from parents wondering where to send their offspring for career training.

I was invited to a tasting of all their entries from different participants from the school with the winning bronze entry being shyly presented by Laven Shiv Kumar, a Creamy Spaghetti infused with saffron served with marinated duck breast and roasted red pepper sauce, accompanied with flavoured nut crumble. This dish certainly deserved the bronze and this young chef Laven will go far with this kind of mastery.

The spaghetti was all dente as it should be and the saffron infusion not only lent it's colour but the subtle fragrance of the crocus flower stamen permeated the whole dish. The marinated duck breast was still pink and the red capsicum with tomato paste sauce

lent a nuance of piquancy to the whole dish with texture provided by the nut crumble.

I also had the pleasure of sampling all their other entries which were all good efforts put in by these fledgling chefs under the guidance of their mentor tutor **Chef Mohamad Safwan.** Keep up the good work Crew Skills. And the next time, perhaps a gold or two.

"I often receive comments from my dear readers to the effect that some of the restaurants I have reviewed were disappointing. I do need to emphasize, which I have done on quite a few occasions, that all restaurants do some dishes well and some not so well. What Needs to be Done

For a start, let us have something done about the double parking, unregulated hawkers and broken pavements, all of which are a hazard to children and old folks alike. It is not only the government, but every citizen's responsibility to ensure the city is safe.

Then, in the Old Town heritage area, hawkers' licenses should only be issued for sale of a wide range of appropriate goods, not imported plastic rubbish. Old Town does not need the Chinese street market it now has, with its uncaring hawkers blocking the streets and walkways. Similarly second-hand cars and those ugly modern 'Games of Chance', should also be removed immediately. There is plenty of scope for quality items and entertainment to replace all these.

Ipoh is said to be a food haven. So let us turn Old Town's Concubine Lane, the very centre of our heritage, into just that. Only issue licenses for a range of quality heritage souvenirs and food, some of which are already there, but operating in entirely the wrong place. Offering quality rather than rubbish will attract a larger number of overseas tourists spending their money here, and that is what we need. There is plenty of room in other parts of town for a daily street market if we really need it. All this requires is effective licensing. In parallel with that, the tourist authority should put Ipoh on the world map. Currently their website http://www.ipoh-city.com/ does not have any Ipoh attraction on its front page, Ipoh City's top three attractions are said to be: Kuala Sepetang, Kellies Castle, and Gua Tempurung. Are they not aware that Ipoh itself actually has several quality homegrown top attractions?


Book Review

Live Life to Serve

r Shan Narayanan credits a near death experience, widely known as an **NDE**, as the motivating factor that drives him to keep the punishing schedule that he maintains today.

It happened in 2012 when an infection in his leg spread into his blood developing into septicaemia. As a result he developed severe pneumonia leading to Adult Respiratory Distress Syndrome. As he was ventilated not knowing if he would recover he saw a **yellow light and heard the Maha Mirtunjya Mantra**. He recovered miraculously to the delight & surprise of his doctors and family. He subsequently saw this same yellow light again in both the **Shirdi Sai Baba centre** in old town and at an **Amman temple in Sungai Siput**.

"God gave me a second chance. Therefore I want to give back", he declared. "I was not so confident as a young man, owing to the fact that I had various bleeds which I only knew it was due to a very rare condition called Factor XIII deficiency at the age of 19. This had a significant emotional impact on my early life." he said.

"Since the NDE I have been driven to help others which led me in 2015, to start training as a **Life Coach** with the Corporate Coach Academy, a coaching school recognised by the **International coaching Federation**." he enthused.

Since then he has had his plate full.

As the newly installed 41st President of the Rotary Club of Kinta, Dr. Shan not only has a goal of inspiring youths during his term but will focus on personal development and developing leadership skills in them. This is in addition to his full-time practice as Consultant Pediatrician at Hospital Fatimah and his work in Life Coaching.

So how did this Ipoh boy who spent all his school years at ACS from kindergarten to 6th form, getting his first medical degree at University of Malaya, followed by housemanship in Penang, then working 6 years in Kuala Lumpur at the **National Blood Bank and Hematology Centre**, end up being a passionate Life Coach?

His interest in Hematology got him a Fellowship in the International Hemophilia Training Centre in Sheffield, UK, under the guidance of Professor Preston whose dedication and passion awoke in Dr. Shan a desire to study Pediatrics as most of their patients were children.

Under **Professor Preston's tutelage**, and given wide exposure, Dr Shan, over a period of 10 years in UK, developed an interest and passion for helping children with special needs, especially those with autism and learning difficulties.

Returning in 2001 to nurse his father, "My father is my hero," Dr Shan then worked for two years in the General Hospital after which he set up his private practice, initially in Ipoh Garden and subsequently in 2006, moved into Fatimah Hospital where he has been ever since.

Here he kept up his special interest in special needs

children and still to this day has a **Child Development Clinic on Wednesdays**. He was the co-founder of the **Autism Support Association for Parents** and in 2008, helped to open a school for school age children with autism in Tambun.

In 2010, Dr Shan co-founded Autism Aspergers Help Association; now known as **OHANA**. He was the founding president. OHANA runs an early intervention programme for children with special needs. He donated RM10K and organised the first '**Walk for Autism**' in Ipoh to raise a further RM20K to set up this centre.

Dr Shan is no stranger to charity work, as volunteerism is in his blood, beginning in his student days in ACS as President of the Benefit Society raising funds for poor students for uniforms, books and other basic school necessities. He is an active member of the Hemophilia Society of Malaysia and co-founder of a sub group in 2015 for women with bleeding disorders known as KHWAN or Kelab Hemostasi Wanita, developing awareness that hereditary bleeding disorders occurs in women too. Ipoh Fine Arts Society supported this cause and raised RM10K for KHWAN.

It was in 2015 that Dr Shan decided to expand his already impressive repertoire of helping skills by enrolling in the **Corporate Coach Academy** and became a **Life Coach**. He felt that coaching skills would enhance his work with special needs children and their families. Coaching is a powerful tool to create self awareness, which is the precursor to empowerment that instils personal power. Personal power gives one the control of one's life even in adversity.

He had a wish to bring coaching to the medical establishment and began with a **Workshop on Coaching For Nurses** at the AR-Ridzuan Hospital attended by 40 nurses from various hospitals. The workshop focused on enhancing interpersonal skills through self-awareness and active listening.

Through Rotary in 2017, when he was the Director of youth services, and now the President, he organised the **Interact Leadership Training Seminar** along with three other certified coaches for the four interact clubs sponsored by Rotary Club of Kinta. The seminar focused on role training, self confidence and teamwork activities.

This year, the Malaysian Medical Association Perak Branch, organised the **7th House Officers Essential Skills** course. It was attended by 62 housemen. Dr Shan was shocked to realise most of the attendees were in the medical profession on the request of their families.

Dr Shan with three other coaches conducted a half-day session on "**Finding your Purpose**" as part of the course. This session helped many of the young doctors find their direction in personal and professional life.

Augmentation Rhinoplasty

ugmentation rhinoplasty is a surgical procedure that can be performed for both aesthetic and functional reasons. Functional reasons for augmentation include providing structural support for deficient areas of the nose such as the upper or lower lateral cartilages. Augmentation can also be performed to enhance the appearance and proportion of nose in relation to the face to restore facial harmony.

There are varieties of materials that can be used for augmentation rhinoplasty. *Non-autologous or artificial materials* used as implants or grafts include medical-grade silicone, medpore or Gore-Tex. Autologous graft is made from materials harvested from your own body. For example, cartilage grafts may come from your ear, ribs or nasal septum. Bone grafts may come from your leg or hip. When tissues from your own body are used, there is a reduced risk of complications such as infection and displacement.



Ideal candidate for augmentation rhinoplasty:

- Completion of facial growth (preferably 13 years of age or older)
 Healthy individuals who do not have life threatening illnesses or medical conditions
- Preferably non-smokers
- Individuals with realistic goals in mind for the improvement of appearance.

Preoperative evaluation before augmentation rhinoplasty

Communication is vital in order to achieve the patient's goals. During the initial consultation, patients should discuss their goals and expectations with the plastic surgeon. The plastic surgeon will work closely with patients to reach an agreement about the desirable results from the surgical procedures involved and their long-term benefits. Every patient is different, therefore a specific treatment regimen is planned to suit an individual's need

- · Discussion about expectation and desired outcome
- Medical conditions, drug allergies and previous medical or surgical treatment
 Use of current medications, vitamins,
- herbal supplements, alcohol, tobacco and drugs should be revealed
- · Discussion of type of anaesthesia
- · Examination and measurement of the face and nose
- · Photography for preoperative and postoperative evaluation

Postoperative expectations

A splint or bandage is usually placed on the outside of the nose to support and protect the new structures during the initial healing phase. After the surgery, there may be swelling, bruises or discomfort, irritation for several days that can be controlled with oral medications, cold compression and ointment. Oral antibiotics and analgesics will be prescribed to reduce the risk of infection and postoperative pain respectively. Any external sutures on the nose will be removed about 7-10 days after the surgery. It may take several months for swelling to resolve and up to a year for the shape of the new nose to be fully refined.



happens, victims will be to nearby hospitals treatment. The outcome will be disastrous if things are poorly managed.

Mindful of this, KPJ Ipoh Specialist Hospital disaster-drill team, led by its Chief Executive Officer, Yusmah Salleh, organised a two-hour disaster exercise in preparation for a possible real-life situation.

The drill is conducted annually. However, this year's scenario was on a fire taking place within the adjacent Regiment 503 (TA) Camp. The exercise was held on Wednesday, October 31.

"The objective is to test the hospital's capacity in coping with an emergency. We too want to see how well our nursing staff are able to handle patients in crisis. Apart from that, management



staff involved also play their roles in handling patients' relatives, media and controlling the crowd in the hospital who are keen to get information on the crisis," explained

Consultants from various disciplines were involved in the drill, namely neurosurgeons, orthopaedic and trauma specialists, anaesthetists, cardiologists and medical officers.

For the disaster drill team, the exercise proved once again that it is important to have a structured and tested patient-management system during crisis so as to be better prepared in a real-life situation.

'There's no such thing as a hundred-percent preparedness. But keeping the organisation's emergency management and communication plans up-to-date will get us as close as possible," said Yusmah.



Longest Cake by Special Kids

ome 76 special education students have gained entry into the Malaysia Book of Records by baking the country's longest cake. The record was created during the National Special Education Skills Carnival 2018 held from October 22 to 24 at Tower Regency Hotel Ipoh.

"We've been doing this voluntary work for six years now. We plan to open more community clinics to provide medical assistance to the needy," said Dr Anantha Kumar, National President of Vadcares Malaysia.

Litter Litter Everywhere and the Danger to You

roperty developers are behaving more like the local councils in providing services and infrastructure, observes Deputy Housing and Local Government Minister Datuk Raja Kamarul Bahrin Shah. He concedes that some councils have failed in providing basic services to the people, causing developers to step in and fill the void.

Let's hope that all councillors have taken note of his keynote address entitled "Reimagining the Housing and Property Industry in the New Malaysia" delivered at a colloquium in Kuala Lumpur a month ago. Is there a big difference between Old Malaysia and New Malaysia at ground level? Life at the centre probably has changed for the better. How about life further out?



Two months before the May 9 general election, this columnist toured four suburbs in Ipoh city — Menglembu, Jelapang, Silibin and Buntong. They all looked the same at the ground; that is to say, litter was strewn about the roadsides, open spaces and drains. Five months after GE14 this columnist revisited Menglembu, Jelapang, Silibin and Buntong, adding Chemor to the list. The colourful scenery hasn't changed. Plastic bags and paper cartons stand out in sharp contrast to the dull green grass at the roadsides and open spaces. Here and there disused mattresses dot the landscape, and

stormwater drain sumps are stuffed with throwaways. In Menglembu, the smoke from open burning of a huge pile of garbage near a children's playground is clearly visible to apartment and terraced house residents.

Ironically, gigantic signboards prominently displayed at many busy stretches carry the slogan: *Ipoh Bersih, Hijau dan Maju*. As such, there is a chronic disconnect between what is

promised and what is delivered. Is it important that we keep the nation clean? Yes, dirty streets carry dirty implications. Local councils appoint



cleaning service contractors to do the job, and contractual fees are paid every month using ratepayers' money. If the job is not done, it is wastage of public funds.

There is also a life-threatening implication. Litter is home to killer mosquitoes and deadly germs because they trap stagnant water and food particles. Litter litter everywhere is a giveaway sign of a nation's health index. If you see abundant litter in the residential areas of all cities and towns, the next thing to do is check the nation's dengue and cancer rates. What's the connection? Litter tells you that people are generally unaware that environmental abuse is a major factor that brings on deadly ailments as well as climate change.

Fond Memories of Deepavali, the Festival of Lights

Thave lived in Malaysia for more than 28 years, the first 27 months in the Shangri-La Hotel ▲KL. I call this period of my life "Anderson in Wonderland", but it was not the hotel that made it that, it was the staff and local guests who took me into their hearts and homes and made sure I took part in every special occasion; festival, weddings and even funerals, of every race or religion. Those months were an unforgettable kaleidoscope of sounds and sights, colours and exotic food. It was a miracle I actually found time and energy to go to work!

My first Deepavali was arranged by a local friend, a university professor, who took it upon himself that I should learn about how to celebrate the Hindu New



Year. It was an evening I shall never forget! Around 8pm that fine evening we arrived in a street somewhere near Brickfields and the view was stunning! Every house was brightly lit with a myriad of coloured lights, both inside and outside. The whole street glittered and sparkled like a child's imaginary fairyland. Beams of light pouring from open doors and windows, added to the brilliance of the scene.

But that was not all, for as we entered my professor's home I was struck by the incredible scene before me. For apart from a table loaded with special festival delicacies, the room was bereft of furniture which had been replaced with lights and lamps of every description; hundreds of them; and on the floor, a delicate Kolam decorated with miniature oil lamps, their flamed dancing in the gentle evening breeze. It was time to savour the special menu, flavoured with exotic spices from the shores of India and beyond. But my journey did not end there for it was time to visit the neighbours, on both sides of the street, for more tastes of India, served by the prettiest of girls in multi-coloured, silk saris reflecting the multitude of lights in every home.

Then, around 10pm, it was time to visit the temple. In the Brickfields area, there are nine temples, five of which are said to be more than a century old. On arrival, I was greeted by the priest and presented with a garland of flowers, which I am assured is an honour reserved only for VIP guests. He then applied the red *Tika* (dot) to my forehead and I was escorted into the outer courtyard. Here, there was an enormous Kolam with every coloured grain of flour meticulously positioned, with dozens of those flickering oil lamps to enhance it.

Finally, in the inner courtyard, I was presented with two sticks – it was time to do the Dandiya or traditional stick dance. About 60 people formed themselves into two concentric circles facing each other. When the music started each circle moved clockwise, clicking their sticks against those opposite. As the tempo increased the circles moved faster and knuckles were clearly in danger.

As I left the temple, exhausted, around 11.30pm the priest kindly presented me with two bags of rice and I returned to my hotel, looking, to the amusement of the staff, more like a reformed Hindi than a Christian!

FMM Celebrates 50-year Milestone

Pederation of Malaysian Manufacturers Perak (FMM) celebrated its 50-year milestone in a branch annual dinner on Thursday, October 25 at Casuarina @ Meru Hotel. The momentous occasion was graced by Sultan Nazrin Shah.

"Earlier on in our administration, we set up a Perak State Investment Advisory Council to streamline our investment micro-targeting, by matching prospective investors' needs with the state's long-term vision, which I am honoured to be a member of. It is this council that has identified, facilitated and

"The largest investment of RM1.1 billion involves Malayan Flour Mills Bhd who will establish an agro-food manufacturing factory in the state. Another agreement involves Top Glove Bhd investing RM100 million to build a glove-making plant here. The state will also assist Central Medicare Sdn Bhd which is building a glove manufacturing plant in Teluk Intan involving an investment of RM600 million. Smart Paints Manufacturing Sdn Bhd will set up a RM50 million paint factory in Batu Gajah," Howard added.

According to him, the state will also assist Optotronic Semiconductors Sdn Bhd in establishing a light-emitting diode factory in Kamunting, Taiping, involving an investment of RM50 million. Kossan Rubber, the first halal glove manufacturer in the world will meet the state government agencies to obtain the necessary approvals to set up an integrated glove factory in Bidor. Tin miner and metal producer Malaysia Smelting Corp Bhd has inked a MoU with the state for leases of land in Klian Intan measuring 423 acres in total which will be used for tin mining-related activities to expand its upstream business.

"Set up schools, training academies, vocational institutions to train your next COO, CEO, chief technician, head engineers, field operatives and robotics manager. Sponsor academics and scholars for their masters and PhD on how to improve your products



and your production. Encourage and incentivise creativity and innovation by setting partnerships with us in government to build incubation and acceleration spaces for our young and upcoming start-ups. The days of 'government knows best and know all' are gone. We need your help and solidarity. Help us help you," Howard concluded.




