



-Welcome 2025: Aspirations for a Sustainable and Inclusive Perak-

"The Perak Budget 2025 presents a new vision focused on enhancing the well-being of its people and ensuring the state's prosperity through strategic development initiatives"



he Perak state government has unveiled its highest budget, allocating RM1.52 billion for 2025, focusing on the people's well-being and the state's development.

Themed Perak Makmur, Rakyat Sejahtera (Prosperous Perak, Thriving People), Menteri Besar Datuk Seri Saarani Mohamad said the budget aims to further the objectives of the Perak Sejahtera 2030 plan, with five key focus areas including environmental sustainability, people's welfare, and food security.

"The budget includes RM981.80 million for development and RM538 million for management. Starting January 2025, general welfare assistance from the Social Welfare Department will be increased by RM100 to RM500, benefiting 6,100 recipients," he said.

An allocation of RM30.22 million has also been set aside for public welfare programmes, including RM24 million for the Perak Sejahtera Card and RM5 million for food aid initiatives.

To foster greater unity, Saarani said RM111.9 million will be allocated to the Perak Islamic Religious Department (JAIPk), while RM12 million has been set aside for the Non-Islamic Affairs Unit (HEBI).

In terms of infrastructure, the state is set to receive RM612 million under the Malaysia Road Records Information System (MARRIS) fund for road maintenance. The Public Works Department (JKR) will also receive RM199.9 million for road and bridge projects.

This historic budget is expected to enhance Perak's economic competitiveness and uplift the well-being of its people across all segments of society.

He called on the people of Ipoh to continue supporting the Ipoh City Council (MBI) and city council members in collectively advancing the city's development.



Beyond Sugar: What You Should now About iabetes





eet Dr Tivya Soundarajan, Consultant Physician and Endocrinologist from Pantai Hospital Ipoh who specializes in diabetes treatment and other diseases of the endocrine system.

According to the National Health and Morbidity Survey (NHMS) 2023, about 3.6 million adults, or 15.6 per cent of Malaysians have diabetes. Alarmingly, two in five adults are unaware of their diabetic status.

Among those who are aware, 56 % do not have good blood sugar control. A whopping 84 per cent of young adults aged 18 to 29, are unaware they have diabetes mellitus.

What is Diabetes?

Diabetes occurs when your body cannot effectively regulate blood sugar levels. This can happen when your pancreas stops producing enough insulin, your cells become resistant to insulin or both.

There are two primary types of diabetes:

- Type 1: Occurs when your immune system attacks your pancreas, destroying its ability to produce insulin.
- Type 2: Occurs when the pancreas doesn't make enough insulin or the body becomes resistant to insulin which is the commoner type and accounts for more than 90 % of diabetes cases. It is primarily triggered by diet and lifestyle factors.

DIABETES: Bubbles should be in your coffee, not your urine!

We all love a cup of foamy coffee a great way to start the day but a foamy urine? Not loving it.

Foamy urine may be a sign of protein in the urine, which is not normal and may be complication in patients with long standing poorly controlled diabetes mellitus, among other known causes.

If you notice foams in your urine that don't settle away even after a few minutes or after you flush and gets more noticeable, then you should see a doctor. Here's why:

A foamy urine is called proteinuria, which essentially means protein present in your urine, which should not be the case in an otherwise healthy person. When your kidneys are damaged, they can allow protein to pass through into your urine. Kidneys

filter waste products and excrete them into the urine, but proteins should not be filtered out into the urine, they should instead stay in the blood.

A simple urine test can confirm proteinuria and how much. Remember, not all foamy urine is a sign of kidney disease and there may be various other causes such as dehydration, urinary tract infections, intense exercise and other kidney diseases.

If diabetes is the underlying cause of

your proteinuria, your doctor may prescribe oral medications or insulin injections to reduce blood sugar levels and reduce the amount of protein in your urine and prevent you from



Diabetes: Do blood sugar swings matter?

Treatment for type 2 diabetes (T2D) no longer focuses exclusively on HbA1c, a blood test that shows what your average blood sugar (glucose) level was over the past two to three months. Diabetes medications have benefits beyond glucose control and latest treatment guidelines recommend choosing therapy according to the presence or absence of coexisting heart and kidney disease, heart failure, and weight.

Glycemic variability refers to swings in blood glucose levels that occur throughout the day. Continuous glucose monitoring (CGM) devices help you manage diabetes with fewer fingerstick checks. A sensor just under your skin measures your glucose levels 24 hours a day. A transmitter sends results to a wearable device

or cell phone so you can track changes to your glucose level in real time. These devices can paint a fuller picture for patients of their daily glucose variability and factors affecting it including meals, exercise and medications, including time spent in the normal range for a person with diabetes and any episodes of high and low glucose levels . Talk with your doctor about whether using a CGM could help you manage your diabetes. CGM devices are available at Hospital Pantai Ipoh.

_Metabolic Surgery A REVOLUTIONARY CURE **FOR TYPE 2 DIABETES**

etabolic surgery has emerged as a gamechanger for reversing Type 2 diabetes, La major component of metabolic syndrome. Metabolic syndrome is characterized by hypertension, high triglycerides, and abdominal obesity, with Type 2 diabetes being the most challenging to manage. Traditional treatments include medications and injectables, but metabolic surgery offers a potential cure.

What is Metabolic Surgery?

Metabolic surgery includes procedures like Rouxen-Y gastric bypass, mini gastric bypass, sleeve

gastrectomy, and sleeve-plus procedures. Initially designed for weight loss, these surgeries have shown remarkable effects on metabolic health, particularly in controlling diabetes.

Success and Benefits

Globally, metabolic surgeries boast an 85% success rate in reversing Type 2 diabetes. At Fatimah Hospital, Dr. Mark Satkunan has achieved a 90% success rate among 30 patients since 2021. The results are striking:

- Weight Loss: Patients typically lose 28–35 kg.
- Improved Health: Reductions in blood sugar levels, lipid profiles, blood pressure, and sleep apnea.
 - Medication Independence: Many patients stop diabetes medications within two weeks.
- Enhanced Quality of Life: Patients report better mobility, reduced joint pain, improved confidence, and self-esteem.

Surgery Details

Metabolic surgeries are performed for patients with a BMI of 32 or higher. These procedures alter digestive processes, promoting hormonal changes that improve insulin sensitivity and glucose control. Success rates for specific procedures like Roux-en-Y gastric bypass are particularly high.

Risks and Side Effects

While effective, some patients experience temporary side effects, such as abdominal fullness, reflux, regurgitation, hair loss, and loose motions. These effects typically resolve with time.

Beyond Weight Loss

A standout case involved a patient with kidney disease showing significant improvement postsurgery. Additionally, these procedures address early diabetes effectively, with stapling and bypass offering similar remission rates of up to 80%.

Metabolic surgery is more than weight loss—it's a pathway to curing diabetes and transforming lives.

EYE HEALTH SERIES - CATARACT

Ipoh Echo's EYE HEALTH series continues with Consultant Eye Surgeon Dr. S S GILL talking to us more about aspects regarding CATARACT.

ATARACT is a condition when the lens of the eye becomes cloudy and loses transparency, causing blurry vision and making everything seem foggy, filmy, or cloudy. It may also have a variety of other symptoms as well. Let's look at some others.

NIGHT VISION

For some, it may make it challenging to drive at night as oncoming car lights may scatter, leading to glare and inability to view the road edge. Colours too may seem washed out and dull. One patient who had her cataracts removed and started appreciating colours properly again, actually asked her brother whether he had repainted his car white because she used to always view his car colour to be brownish before

having her cataracts out. This is because a maturing cataract makes it difficult to distinguish blue colours over time.

"SECOND-SIGHT OF AGING"

There is a phenomenon called "second sight of ageing" where paradoxically near vision temporarily improves as a result of the increased nearsightedness from swelling of the cataract. You may sometimes hear some elderly person boasting that they do not need reading glasses anymore to read their daily newspapers. This

so-called improved vision for the near is usually short-lived and is a symptom of maturing cataracts.


FREQUENT CHANGE OF SPECTACLES

If you find that you have been having to frequently change prescription spectacles every few months, this too may be a symptom of cataracts. Essentially, the spectacle powers or contact lens powers w have to be increased to get acceptable vision to the patient.

Some patients do not notice their blurring vision because the cataract is significant in only one eye.

UNNOTICED BLURRING VISION

This is because the fellow eye compensates for the vision requirement for their daily activity. The blurring vision is only detected when the vision of each eye is checked separately, only to be surprised that vision in one eye (with the cataract) is so poor. Rarely, cataracts may sometimes cause double vision (also known as diplopia). Cataracts usually progress gradually and do not cause eye pain. The eye only becomes painful when the cataract is hypermature, resulting in a condition called glaucoma where the eye pressure increases. Therefore, it is important not to wait for the cataract to be too mature before seeking eye treatment. Rapid or painful changes in vision are suspicious of other eye diseases and should be evaluated by an ophthalmologist. Take note of any unusual eye symptoms and get your eyes checked annually if you are above 40 years of age.

Politeknik Ungku Omar (PUO) continues to lead efforts in empowering the Orang Kurang Upaya (OKU) community through innovative educational initiatives that open new paths toward success and brighter opportunities.

Since June 2000, PUO has been offering the Certificate In Construction Skill specifically for students with hearing impairments, providing opportunities for those who have completed Form 5 in government schools.

Srihafiza Kamaruddin, Head of the Exclusive Certificate In Construction, explained that this programme aims to provide full-time skills training in the construction field, in line with Perakuan 169 (1979).

"This programme, now known as Certificate In Construction Skill, is designed to enhance educational opportunities for the OKU community, in line with the OKU Policy (2016-2022) and the OKU Act 2008.

"The rebranding to Certificate In Construction Skill was approved in October 2023 to ensure it meets current industry needs," she said.

The programme lasts for two years (four semesters), including an industrial training component. The curriculum consists of compulsory courses, discipline-specific courses, and electives, specifically tailored for

"Among the compulsory courses are Islamic Education / Moral Education, Bahasa Melayu, Co-curriculum, and Basic Entrepreneurship.

"For discipling courses, students will delug into technical aspects such as Construction N

"For discipline courses, students will delve into technical aspects such as Construction Material Engineering Drawing, Cost Estimation for Building Works, Computer Aided Design(CAD) Building Services Basic, Building Construction Civil Engineering Laboratory Domestic Plumbing, Carpentry Work Site Supervision Basics," she explained.

Focus on Industry Needs The programme also offers elective courses such as Occupational Safety & Health (OSH) to prepare students for the challenges of a career in the construction industry.

Through this comprehensive approach, PUO aims to produce a highly skilled workforce capable of competing in the industry, while harnessing the talents of the hearing-impaired

"Students also enjoy various facilities such as hostel accommodation, complete learning facilities, non-repayable financial assistance, and lessons supported by sign language," she added.

Graduates of the programme have successfully forged career prospects as Draftsmen, Civil Technicians, Carpenters, Plumbers, Bricklayers, Painter, and Entrepreneurs.

Analysis and Data to Prevent Sinkhole Risks in Ipoh

he risk of sinkhole incidents in the city can be mitigated through the method of underground utility mapping to avoid potential hazards.

The Ipoh City Council (MBI) has partnered with Koridor Utiliti Darul Ridzuan (KUDR) in an initiative to gather data on existing utilities before excavation work is carried out.

Ipoh Mayor, Datuk Rumaizi Baharin, stated that 41 utility mapping files covering 41 locations over a distance of 10,387 meters have been successfully recorded through this collaboration.

He added that Ipoh will have a 'Smart Green City' system to provide more detailed mapping data and outline necessary actions.

"This also involves other agencies such as the Department of Minerals and Geoscience, Department of Irrigation and Drainage, and the Meteorological Department to collect climate data.

"Among the data being gathered are factors that can affect groundwater levels, rainfall patterns, temperature, humidity, and evaporation rates," he said.


With this data, spatial analysis will be conducted at high-risk locations using mapping and visualization techniques, expected to commence in mid-2025.

IPOH'S WORST FLOODS IN 28 YEARS:

BEYOND NATURE'S FURY?

The year-end floods of 2024, described as the worst in 28 years, have left a trail of destruction across Ipoh.

Continuous heavy rains throughout November and December, combined with blocked drainage and uncollected waste, turned manageable conditions into a crisis.

Severely impacted areas include Kampung Tasek, Kampung Seri Kinta, Tanjung Rambutan, and Taman Arena Kepayang Fair Park.

Stagnant floodwaters in Taman Arena Kepayang, filled with trash and oil, went viral, sparking public outrage.

The floods forced many residents into temporary relief shelters (PPS), with significant financial losses reported due


to damaged properties and belongings. Other frequently affected areas include Kampung Kepayang, Bercham, Kampung Tai Lee, Taman Hock Aun, Taman Cempaka, Tanjung Rambutan, and Tambun.

Dr. Richard Ng, Chairman of Ipoh City Watch and former city councillor, criticized the lack of proactive measures.

"We often blame climate change, but persistent issues like clogged rivers and poor maintenance are the real culprits.

"Authorities must enforce consistent river cleaning, inspect water pumps, and maintain drains," he said, urging accountability from the Ipoh City Council (MBI) and elected representatives.

"As Ipoh braces for unpredictable weather patterns,

This severe traffic congestion usually occurs in the ▲ mornings and evenings, and is even worse during festivals and school holidays.

One of the main issues here is the traffic lights.

Congestion often happens when drivers in the rightmost lane attempt to move into the left lane when the traffic light for straight-through traffic turns green, while the light for turning right is still red.

Observations show that traffic starts to get congested from 7:30 AM, as people rush to work and school.

In the evening, congestion begins around 5:00 PM, and is even worse on Fridays.





Talan Sultan Nazrin Shah is another hotspot that J frequently experiences severe traffic, particularly during peak hours in the morning and evening, as well as on weekends.

Congestion occurs from the flyover down to Megoplex, with vehicles trying to enter Kampung Sungai Rokam, Kampung Melayu Sungai Rapat, and continue towards Simpang Pulai and other destinations.

Traffic starts to build up from 5:00 PM to 7:00 PM. The congestion is worsened by the traffic coming from the flyover and underneath it, as some drivers want to turn left into Kampung Sungai Rokam and other nearby villages.

The extraordinary congestion along the road from the **▲** Ipoh KTM Station to the Medan Kidd roundabout during peak hours is a frequent source of stress for road

This problem also causes traffic jams in the KTM parking area, as many people drop off passengers heading to the train station at certain times.

The situation worsens when there are roadworks or upgrades, and barricades are placed on the road.

The congestion not only affects this area but also spills over to the road in front of the Tun Razak Library near Jalan Panglima Bukit Gantang Wahab.



A Bold Vision in Design

Spanning approximately 30,000 square feet, this five-storey building integrates office spaces, conference rooms, and galleries. Its striking design features a 'box-in-a-box' concept with V-shaped columns, lifting its upper floors while providing street-level vehicular access.

Despite facing challenges, including height restrictions imposed by a neighbouring army camp, the building's design thrives on innovation. The installation of west-facing, double-layered walls with dense louvres ensures privacy while reducing heat and glare.

A central courtyard bathes the interiors in natural light, supplemented by Naco windows for effective ventilation. Grasscrete and bioswales further reinforce their eco-friendly credentials, reducing urban heat and managing stormwater effectively.

Sustainability at Its Core

The structure achieves eight United Nations Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs), notably in responsible consumption and production. High percentages of recycled construction materials, minimal construction waste, and innovative water management systems, such as rainwater harvesting and greywater recycling, underline its commitment to sustainability.

Powered entirely by rooftop solar panels, the building features a Building Management System (BMS) that educates visitors on energy and water efficiency in real-time.

Empowering the Community

Initially planned as an office space, 1 Lasam evolved into a community hub post-pandemic. It now houses a library, co-working spaces, and a venue for local non-profit organisations.

Its free museum showcases Ipoh's tin-mining heritage, transforming the building into a cultural and educational destination. By providing free meeting spaces, 1 Lasam supports local organisations like Dementia Awareness and the Perak Academy, fostering engagement and inclusivity.

A Model for Cost-Effective Sustainability

Demonstrating that sustainable architecture need not be expensive, 1 Lasam was constructed at an impressively low cost of USD16 per square metre. Locally sourced materials, such as Ipoh limestone concrete and artisan red bricks, were used in their raw form, eliminating the need for paint and reducing maintenance costs.

An Enduring Impact

Since its completion, 1 Lasam has garnered accolades, including the The Malaysian Institute of Architects Silver Award and the Asia Pacific Property Award.

Beyond its aesthetic appeal, post-occupancy surveys highlight high user satisfaction with indoor air quality, lighting, and thermal comfort. The inclusion of biophilic elements has further boosted productivity and well-being.

1 Lasam is more than a building; it is a statement of what can be achieved when vision and purpose converge. As a symbol of sustainable development, it continues to inspire future architecture in Ipoh and beyond.



The box-in-a-box effect prevents heat from the east and west from penetrating into the building. When combined with the thick roof insulation, temperatures within the building was kept highly stable.

Tina shares the story of how she became the founder and Executive Chairman of Taj International College (TIC) 20 years ago.

"I used to live in Kuala Lumpur and was a housewife for almost six years."

"I am a graduate in Law from the University of Leeds, UK, and hold a Masters of Business Administration from UWE England.

"Previously, TIC was under the responsibility of my eldest brother, but due to health issues, he couldn't focus on managing the college.

"I volunteered to take over, as at that time, my father had decided to sell the

"There was a condition when I took on this responsibility, although it was a family business, I did not accept any financial investment or assistance from my father," she explained.

She added that for nearly two years, she commuted daily by bus from Kuala Lumpur to Ipoh to manage TIC.

Meanwhile, talking about her role as the Perak's Iconic Woman, she said she would be more aggressive in conducting outreach to rural schools in Perak.

"I will definitely bring the issue of education for all age groups. We don't want these children to fall behind in their studies and miss taking the SPM.

"We will collaborate with the State Education Department and other strategic partners. I will conduct motivational tours for the Sijil Pelajaran Malaysia (SPM) in 60 schools across 12 districts in Perak," she said.

Previously, she has been involved in various corporate social responsibility (CSR) programs, women's empowerment initiatives, and assisting with sending institutions of higher learning (IPT) students during COVID-19.

One of her goals for the coming years is to establish her own foundation called Yavasan Ibu Tina.

"This foundation will focus on education and the welfare of orphaned children." "I want to ensure that the welfare of these orphaned children, particularly in education, is taken care of from a young age to guarantee their future," she said.

THE INK THAT CAPTURES MALAYSIA'S SOUL



New icons have shaped Malaysia's cultural identity as profoundly as Dato' Mohd Nor Khalid, better known as Dato' Lat. His cartoons, filled with humor, warmth, and unmistakable relatability, offer a snapshot of Malaysian life that resonates across generations. Today, Lat stands tall as both a national treasure and a proud son of Perak.

Lat's journey began remarkably early. At just 13 years old, he published his first comic, "Tiga Sekawan Menangkap Pencuri" with Sinaran Brothers in 1964. Unbeknownst to the publishers, they were working with a teenager and paid him a modest sum for a groundbreaking debut.

By 17, Lat had cemented his place in the industry with his comic series, "Keluarga Si Mamat," which ran in Berita Minggu for an incredible 26 years. These works, alongside his later masterpieces like Kampung Boy, became more than art—they became a reflection of Malaysia itself.

The culmination of Lat's legacy can now be explored at the Lat House Gallery in Batu Gajah, Perak. Here, visitors can trace his extraordinary journey, from his first sketches as a boy to his celebrated works that earned him the titles of Seniman Diraja (Royal Artist) in 2023 and Anugerah Seniman Negara (National Artist Award) in 2024.

The gallery houses a replica of his childhood kampung home, complete with pre-World War II furnishings, offering a glimpse into the life that inspired much of his art.

For those who grew up with Lat's cartoons, the gallery is a walk-through memory lane. For younger visitors, it's an immersive introduction to the wit and wisdom of a man who captured Malaysia's essence with a pen.

As Perak's finest export, Lat's legacy lives on not just in his timeless art but in the hearts of Malaysians everywhere.




